

Roseburg Indians Held Scoreless By Grants Pass

Cavemen, in Armistice Day Football, Win Their First Victory of Season, 13 to 0

The Grants Pass Cavemen, thirsting for one victory out of an otherwise arid season, achieved their goal here Tuesday, defeating the Roseburg Indians 13 to 0 in a hard-fought game in which the Indians were held scoreless for the first time this year. Held strictly on the defensive in the annual Armistice day struggle between the teams of the two schools, the Indians made only one serious scoring threat, when a second period drive ended with a pass interception on the five-yard line.

The game was interesting to watch, with Grants Pass using a very deceptive running attack, while Roseburg resorted to aerial thrusts which failed in the pinches due to an alert Grants Pass defense. The game was further enlivened by two fistic encounters, one between players, resulting in the ejection from the game of a man from each squad, and the other in which a Grants Pass player was forcibly restrained from slugging the referee and was taken out of the contest.

Cavemen Score Early

Grants Pass had a break early in the game, when Young's attempted punt from his own 37-yard line was blocked, due to lack of protection, and the Cavemen took over on their own 40 to march to the Roseburg 1-yard line where the Indians halted the drive. Clayton, however, made a 17-yard return of Young's punt, and the Cavemen this time were not to be denied, driving from the Roseburg 19-yard line to score. The attempted kick from placement failed and Grants Pass took a 6 to 0 lead.

Near the end of the second period, Young completed a pass to Anderson on a deadman play to put the ball on the Grants Pass 11-yard marker.

Running plays advanced the ball to the 5-yard stripe, but there Young's pass to Wimberly was intercepted by Preuss, as the half ended.

Another pass interception by Preuss on the Roseburg 34-yard line, put Grants Pass in position for the second touchdown, early in the third period, Preuss advancing to the 2-yard line on the three-man spinner play which was responsible for the principal gains by the visitors, and then powering through center for the tally. Prosser kicked the extra point.

Roseburg succeeded in penetrating to the Grants Pass 20-yard line midway in the third period, but again the effort was nullified by a pass interception, this time by Gray, who nearly broke away for another touchdown.

During the balance of the contest the Indians were kept on defense.

Penalties for offside and roughness were frequent on both sides.

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U. of O. Has Close Call in Defeating Santa Clara 21-19

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12.—(AP)—The University of Oregon today thanked the kicking toe of fullback Jimmy Newquist and the timeclock for a 21-to-19 victory over Santa Clara yesterday.

The Ducks looked like walk-away winners after scoring twice in the first period, again in the third, and holding the Broncos far away from scoring soil until the third period was almost over.

But once the pitching arm of halfback Jesse Freitas came into play the Oregon lead melted. On four passes he moved the Broncos from their own 26-yard line to a touchdown in the third period.

At the start of the fourth he engineered an 87-yard thrust on passes—the longest producing a 52-yard gain—for the second score. Bill Braun missed the first conversion kick, had the second blocked.

As the crowd roared admiration, Freitas started again, this time from his own 17. He let Ward Heiser pass to Dan Willis for 16, then threw a 32-yarder to Heiser. He was hurt on the next play and had to retire but the impetus carried over. Casanaga threw two passes, the second for the touchdown.

At one time Santa Clara completed nine consecutive throws. Coach Tex Oliver left a bevy of second, third and fourth stringers on the field during the Broncos rally. The clock closed out the Broncos chance to win. Two minutes were left after their last touchdown.

Oregon scored twice on Roblin to Crish passes for 28 and 6 yards and on a brilliant 71-yard punt return by Roblin.
