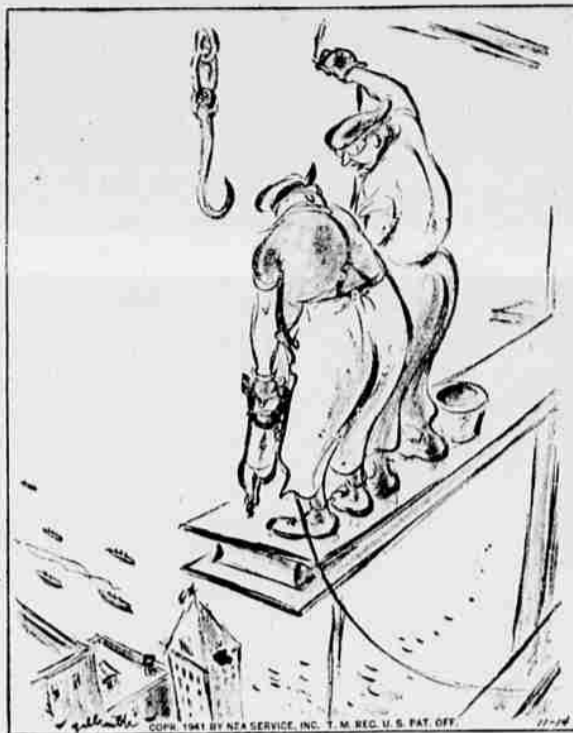

Air Filter Unit Here Still Needs Women Workers

Approximately 40 women still are needed to man the air defense warning service filter center at the Roseburg armory, according to Lieutenant John Truman Runyan, commanding officer. Efforts are being made to provide a personnel of 160 volunteer workers, thoroughly trained in all departments of the work and at present registration is about 40 short of the goal.

Filter center workers are asked to give about five hours per month to training and practice, Lieutenant Runyan reports. Classes are held each second and fourth week, each session lasting for about two and one-half hours. This is all the time that will be required of volunteers, he states, except in case of actual emergency, or in an occasional test.

Work Easy To Learn

"I fully realize that the recruiting of 160 women for this work in a city the size of Roseburg is a difficult task," Lieutenant Runyan said, "but I believe it can be accomplished. This is the same sized crew that is being formed in cities of much greater population, yet I believe that we will have no more difficulty in obtaining the desired number of volunteers than will be encountered in cities where the population is larger."

"We have had a few cases in which we have found women who wanted to volunteer their services but feared that the work was too complicated and difficult to learn. This is not the case and, in fact, we have found only a very few women who could not quickly and easily learn the procedure. The work is not hard to learn and it is possible to become thoroughly proficient in only one or two practice sessions. No woman desiring to serve in this defense capacity need be afraid of encountering any difficulty."

Importance Pointed Out

Mr. Runyan points out that the air defense warning service is the only civilian defense measure over which the U. S. army exercises direct supervision. This service, he states, will be of the utmost importance, both in military and civilian defense in the event of Pacific coast air raids, which, in view of possible developments of the near future, may very easily materialize.

Any women of Roseburg or vicinity who are willing to give the small amount of time and effort needed to prepare for service in this branch of the defense program are urged by Mr. Runyan to register immediately at the office of the Roseburg chamber of commerce.

The next practice sessions will be held Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, Nov. 24, 25 and 27, and it is hoped to have the crews recruited to full strength by that time, Lieutenant Runyan states.
