Wayne Morris, recent star of "I Wanted Wings," became a member of Uncle Sam's Navy in May, 1941, when he was appointed to the rank of Ensign.

When asked what he thought of the United States Navy, Morris said, "I think every man who is considering joining a military service should look into the 'chance of a lifetime' which the Navy and Naval Reserve offer to get into the big-pay field of the future—aviation. In the Navy you can attend the finest flight training schools in the world, and receive in-

S. P. Service Adds Weather Report

Travelers on Southern Pacific's principal trains are now getting a terminal weather report as part of the regular service.

As a result, the passenger approaching San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Houston, New Orleans or Chicago gets an accurate idea of just what he should wear for maximum comfort when he gets off the train.

The weather man is the Pullman porter, who receives his data by wire. He delivers his forecast of conditions along with his "good mornings" as travelers near the end of their trips.

According to J. E. Clark, local Southern Pacific agent, the new weather information service is filling a real need created by the efficiency of modern railroad air-conditioning. Today, he points out, it is virtually impossible for a train passenger to form any accurate notion of outside temperatures without actually getting off the train, and as a result he is frequently at a loss to choose the proper clothing.

Germany's attack on Russia, and the recent successes of the red army, raise some questions of grave concern to Christians around the world. If Germany is defeated, it will be due to four factors: 1. The amazing performance of the Royal Air Force. 2. The superb strategy of the British navy. 3. The American aid in money and materials. 4. And the unexpected strength and power of the Russian armies. This means that Russia will be in a position to make demands at the peace parleys that may be extremely embarrassing. The attitude of the soviets toward all forms of religion is too well known to need additional elaboration. How far will Russia go, as a victor, in her efforts to enforce that attitude on the rest of the world. The terrorism of the nazi party in Germany can be matched by the record of purges carried out in Russia under the direction of Joseph Stalin. The fact that Russian force is relieving the pressure on Britain is an occasion for thanksgiving, but Christian people to know that no promises are made to Russia, even as an ally, which will further close the doors of the world on Christianity. Russia has been very definite in her efforts to wipe out all effects of Christianity and unless the United States and Great Britain are alert they may find an unpleasant member at the peace table.
