

Stanford Favored To Down Cougars In Tilt Tomorrow

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Stanford charges into the home stretch in its drive for a second straight Pacific coast conference championship when it faces Washington State tomorrow in the far west's top football encounter.

The W. S. C. Cougars, the coast's most-improved team in recent games, are the next-to-last hurdle in Stanford's Rose Bowl path.

But the Cougars have shown a penchant for knocking over potential champions this season, and may give the T-formation Indians their toughest battle of the year in the contest at Palo Alto. Already W. S. C. has beaten Oregon, which gave Stanford a terrific battle in the season opener, and Oregon State, only team to walloper the Indians.

Both teams will be handicapped by injuries to star players, but Stanford has been installed as a heavy favorite. The Indians will be minus the services of speedy Halfback Eric Armstrong, while Washington State may have to forego its famed passing attack because of Billy Sewell's arm injury. The Cougars have done all right without passing, though, their last three games by their strong ground game.

If Stanford gets by this one, it has only to dump a banged-up California eleven in the coast's "big game" two weeks away. One victory in their last two games would automatically give the Indians at least a tie for the conference title, and two wins would sew up the Rose Bowl bid.

In the only other major conference games Saturday, California clashes with Oregon State at Berkeley. The Beavers, still in the running for the Rose Bowl by virtue of their own win over Stanford, will be a strong favorite. The California Bears have had trouble finding a backfield combination since injuries cost them left halfbacks Jim Jurkovich and Al Derlan, and their offense is not expected to have improved since their loss to Washington last week.

Army Head Swats Overseas Rumors

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—(AP)—General George C. Marshall, chief of staff, issued a formal statement today declaring "there is no foundation whatsoever for the allegation or rumor that we are preparing troops for a possible expedition to Africa or other critical area outside this hemisphere."

The statement was prompted, General Marshall said, by published reports that the war department was conducting a recruiting campaign for three-year enlistments for service overseas.

"Several of these articles are calculated to give the impression that we are engaged in building up an expeditionary force, and one paper I understand has already taken us to Africa," the statement said.

(War department officials said yesterday that selective service trainees and national guardsmen were being circularized as to their willingness to enlist for regular three-year terms in the army and to serve overseas if necessary.)

The chief of staff explained that the department has been striving to build up the number of volunteer, three-year men to man the garrisons in outlying possessions and the new Atlantic bases, as well as to build up a force of volunteers large enough to relieve the marines in Iceland and British units there.

Slayer Hanged In Washington Prison

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 14.—(AP)—John Bruce Anderson, 58, was hanged in Washington State penitentiary last night, paying his life for the heinous murder of his Spokane valley neighbor, David Johnson, 16 months ago.

A few hours before, Anderson wrote a statement in his death cell protesting his innocence of the crime for which he was to hang—shooting Johnson when the latter caught him in the act of stealing eggs—and named another man as the killer.

He was arrested in Toppenish August 28, 1940, while masquerading under Johnson's name and attempting to sell property owned by Johnson at Marshall after having the dead man's bank account transferred to Selah.

Separate letters were left by Anderson for his 85-year-old mother, Mrs. Hattie A. Patterson, at Fort Dodge, Kans., and his sister, Hattie A. Bruner, Kansas City, Kans. He was a native of Morrison, Ill.

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Earl K. Nixon, director, said today the Oregon department of geology and mineral industries had been informed that 40 per cent manganese ores would be considered for federal contracts.

The announcement, from Federal Loan Administrator Jesse Jones, said the move was to stimulate domestic production.

Railroad Vet Killed

PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—(AP)—E. M. Schrader, 71, assistant general yardmaster for the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway, was killed by a switch train locomotive as he walked across the yards here last night.

He had been employed by the company since 1909.

Auto Kills War Vet

LAFAYETTE, Nov. 14.—(AP)—State Officer W. A. Zossel said rain as obscured the vision of Arthur Kenney, Dayton, driver, that he failed to see Lesel C. Frell, 48, crossing the highway near here yesterday.

Frell, a World War veteran and local business man, was killed outright.

Rescued From Fire

PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Frank L. Mats, 69, janitor, was rescued from a burning apart-

ment house last night. He was hospitalized with back and chest injuries.

Damage to the three-story structure was estimated at \$2,000.

Lumber Plant Burns

EUGENE, Nov. 14.—(AP)—West Side Lumber company officials considered plans today to rebuild the company mill destroyed yesterday by fire of undetermined origin.

J. C. Klein, office manager, said there was no insurance and that the loss would total about \$35,000.

Most of the lumber stocks were untouched.
