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A Pledge to Labor?

IN America in the present national emergency there is an undoubted wave of anger aroused every time a strike is called or threatened in defense industries. The mass of the people feel that now is no time for this sort of thing when everybody is being asked to make sacrifices of some kind.

Labor is afraid that, under the guise of national emergency, there may be some reactionaries who might seek to take away what it has gained, to strip it of some of its protective laws, to make a dead letter of many statutes.

It might be well to take a leaf out of Britain's book. Union labor is more highly organized there than here and it has a political party of its own to fight for its objectives. Labor is more united there. In Britain there is no division as in this country between the A. F. of L. and the C. I. O. In fighting Britain's war, labor has taken places in the government and has given up many things for the time being.

There are few strikes in Britain seriously holding up production of defense materials.

Against its own union rules, British labor is submitting to dictation in the crafts so that many more hands may be put to work in the armaments factories.

Against all its principles, labor there is working longer hours and giving up half-holidays.

In Britain, as here, there lurked the fear that after the war all these concessions might be taken as precedent and made permanent. But the government has given its pledge that when peace comes all that labor had won and that it voluntarily gave up shall be restored. The government is even preparing a bill for Parliament to enact that pledge into law.

It might be a very good idea if congress and the administration took similar steps here to reassure American labor as to the future. They could guarantee labor "normalcy" when the present emergency ends.

Kennedy the Iconoclast

DO not be surprised if you hear Congressman Martin J. Kennedy of New York is being given the polar stare and that some of his colleagues make snooty faces or fail to speak when they pass by. He is apt to be a lonely outcast, a veritable pariah with no body in the capital at Washington to give him even a stony nod.

He has done the unheard of. He has broken the unwritten law. He has failed to be clubby. His dreadful offense is one that his nervous colleagues will have a hard time forgiving or forgetting. Even sack cloth and ashes will not appease them.

This rash brash man has actually introduced a bill in congress to pay its members on the basis of \$25 per day for each day they are in session, instead of the 10,000 lettuce leaves per annum they now enjoy. He estimates this would reduce their salaries to about \$5,000 and thereby set the nation a noble example of self-sacrifice.

Here is where we offer to be our best-laundered fancy shirt but our colleagues will refuse to be noble.

movements at sea and indicate that great numbers of warships and troop transports are being

massed off the coast of northern Indo-China.

It is through Indo-China, toward the Malay Peninsula and the southern end of the Burma road, that Japan is expected to strike in the south—if she does strike.

THERE is also the threat that Japan will strike the Russians in the rear in Siberia while they are fighting Hitler in the west.

Hitler, you see, is trying to use Japan to bluff us out of complete help to the British in the Atlantic by the threat of a two-ocean war. We're probably only those on the inside know) undertaking to bluff Japan out of tackling the Russians in the rear.

It's hard to say where this game of bluff will lead.

ON the home front, today's dispatches carry this paragraph:

"Labor disputes today cast dark shadows over the immediate future of railroad transportation, long distance telephone communication and the mining of soft coal to fuel the nation's steel mills."

This situation is worrying the British. Austin Hopkinson, an independent member, opening debate in parliament on the British war policy, says the U. S. labor situation "may be leading up to a general strike due simply to impotence of trade union leaders," and adds that in spite of the contribution of the United States Britain's enemy (Hitler) "now has a greater production capacity and uses that capacity very much better than we do."

U. S. Combat Planes Sent on Secret Mission

WITH THE ARMY IN THE FIELD, Nov. 15. (AP)—Sudden withdrawal of combat planes for a secret destination has cut into the air power which the army, the navy and the marine corps has ready for the army maneuvers in the Carolinas. It was learned today.

An unimpeachable authority disclosed that aerial units, already planned for the army general headquarters war games November 15-30, have been recalled without explanation.

"We don't know where they have gone but our best guess is overseas," a high officer said. He would not say whether the planes were army, navy or marine, how many there were or whether the pilots also were sent on the mission. His position was so high that the information could not be challenged.

About 400 planes originally were assigned for the maneuvers.

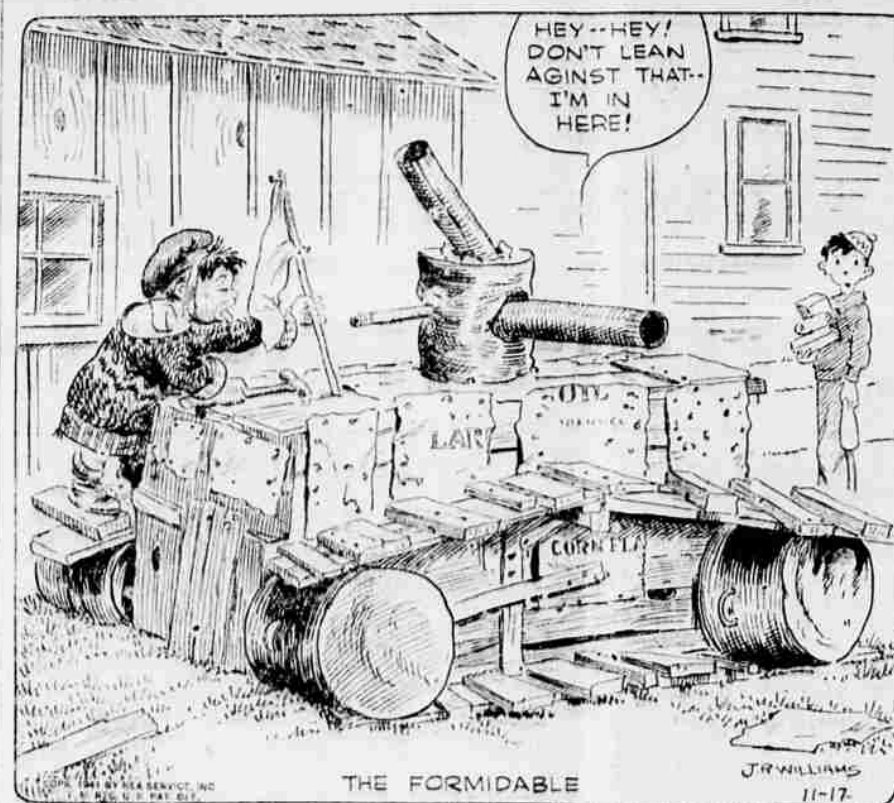
Minor Smoke Damage Caused by Flue Fire

Diphtheria Cases Mild; Only Six In Whole County

Cooperation of parents in securing immunization of children against diphtheria has been excellent, Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer, reported today. More than 400 immunizations have been conducted in city schools by the health unit, while family physicians also have immunized a very large number of children.

Two new cases of diphtheria have been reported in Roseburg the past three days. Dr. Wainwright advises and the six patients now under quarantine in Roseburg comprise all the known cases within the county. The disease in a mild form, he states, has been quite prevalent throughout the entire state.

A few patients have been isolated for observation, Dr. Wainwright reports, and cultures have been taken for examination.

Parents are urged by the county health officer to secure immunization for children who so far have not been given the protective treatment and test. The immunization may be obtained from the family physician or through the county health unit.

Lesnevich Again Beats Mauriello

NEW YORK, Nov. 15. (AP)—Gus Lesnevich, the tough Russian from Cliffside, N. J., probably set himself up for a third crack at Billy Conn by his impressive 15-round victory over Young Tammy Mauriello in their light-heavyweight title battle last night at the garden.

For the second time in three months, Gus proved conclusively that he has too many guns for the game but inexperienced kid from the Bronx. He won the unanimous verdict of the referee and two judges despite a spectacular rally by Mauriello in the late rounds.

Gus claimed after the battle that Promoter Mike Jacobs had promised him another crack at Conn in February, providing he fanned Tammy again, and he said he didn't intend to defend his 175-pound crown again until after he had tried conclusions with Conn as a heavyweight. Conn, before going into the unlimited division, twice fanned Gus in rounds for the lightweight title.

Though there wasn't a knock-down last night, Gus and Tammy put on a punishing duel that had the crowd yelling most of the way. Both came out of it with their features well puffed. So swift was the pace that from the third round on, Mauriello was given a whiff of oxygen every time he sat down.

Hunter Tromped by Elk Herd Bags Big Bull

SHELTON, Wash., Nov. 15. (AP)—Emil Lauber, creamery manager, today told how he got up from under the hooves of a band of stampeding elk and bagged a big bull near the headwaters of the Cowlitz river in Jefferson county.

He exhibited the bull (weighed 670 pounds) and bruises and cuts all over his body as proof.

Lauber said he was walking through a clearing in shoulder-high ferns when a shot fired by Miles Elliott, also of Shelton, started a band of about 30 elk

which had bedded down in the undergrowth.

"I hit them with my gun butt and my fists," he said, "but they howled me over every time I managed to get back on my feet." After the stampede passed, Lauber brought down the biggest beast in the band.

Morgenthau Plan Cuts Out Road Aid to States

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15. (AP)—Secretary Morgenthau said yesterday he believed \$1,000,000 could be cut from non-defense appropriations and outlined an economy program which would eliminate federal highway aid to states completely in the fiscal year 1943-44.

Morgenthau read a statement before a special congressional administrative economy committee, of which he is a member. Senator Byrd (D-Va.), committee chairman, said he was hopeful that \$1,500,000,000 and \$2,000,000,000 annually could be whittled from non-essential federal spending.

Morgenthau told the committee that "there are certain classes of non-defense expenditures which consist in large part of construction projects, such as reclamation work, river and harbor work, road building, etc."

Five Children Perish When Fire Hits Home

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 15. (AP)—Five children died in their blazing home yesterday while their mother, Mrs. Frances Perrine, a widow, was across the street caring for an invalid neighbor.

The dead were Elmer Perrine, 9, a crippled youngster who didn't go to school yesterday because his foot hurt; Francis, 5; Richard, 4; Michael, 3; and Donald, five and a half months old. The baby died in a hospital after his mother raced into the blazing house and carried him out. She suffered painful but not serious burns.

Fire Chief Art Quinn blamed a defective flue for the fire.

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Scrap Aluminum Gather Followed By Official Row

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15. (AP)—With their fingers crossed, defense officials predicted today that the U. S. would catch up with and keep abreast of aluminum demands within the next three or four months.

Although giving major credit to plant expansion and new facilities, which have been rushed since last spring, OPM officials declared that the government's "pots and pans" collection last summer was an important factor.

In the same breath, OPM made it plain that this campaign had been tucked away in the never-again file.

With more than 12,000,000 pounds of scrap contributed, officials estimated that the drive will ultimately produce about 7,000,000 pounds of second-grade aluminum, suitable for some types of aircraft construction, battleship parts, shell fuse parts, tank parts, bomb fuses, and other military items.

But, OPM still is receiving complaints about delays in moving the piles of pots and pans and jibes that the campaign was a take and the pots and pans worthless in defense production.

On the major point, OPM officials blame Fiorella La Guardia, who directed the campaign as civilian defense coordinator, and who barred junk and waste dealers from participating.

The OPM's row with La Guardia has raged behind the scenes since before the aluminum drive began last July. Recently, William Knudsen, OPM director-general, brought it into the open with a terse comment that La Guardia made a "silly mistake" in believing the scrap collected by and for the government could then be turned over to junk dealers and sold for profit.
