THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF REBEKAH LODGE HELD AT GLENDALE

GLENDALE, Nov. 15.—The thirty-fifth annual convention of the Rebekah lodge, district No. 12, was held in the I. O. O. F. hall Thursday. Aliens Now Need Special Permits to Leave U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Aliens who want to leave the United States must get special permission from now on. The state department yesterday issued instructions on the subject, indicating that the move was designed to combat spies' activities.

Permits for departure will not be granted, a presidential proclamation at the same time declared, if such a permit would be prejudicial to the interests of the nation.

The state department also tightened procedure for aliens' entry. Visas now must be closely scrutinized by the state department. Certain categories will be exempt, it was said, including Canadians.
