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Bracing for Tax Squawk

THIS talk about economy in non-defense governmental agencies isn't all hoopy, by any means.

This is the observation of Jack Stinnett, an Associated Press columnist at Washington, who carries his comment further:

In high government circles, the theory is that John Q. won't cream over sacrifices for national defense but that he won't stand for any boondoggling now.

That kind of reasoning is driving some federal officials to settle down to some head-thumping and although little has been done so far, the pressure is increasing to streamline the mechanics of government and eliminate all the trills that have nothing to do with national defense.

All of this talk about stripping the non-defense agencies of all out essentials wouldn't mean much if the present classifications of "national defense" agencies is continued.

Under a re-definition, only the first line defense agencies, such as War, Navy, OEM (office of emergency management), OPM, Price Administration, and one or two others would get this rating.

It's more than talk, or at least will be when John Q. gets his first income tax notice next March. That's how official Washington has it sized up, anyway.

THE Japanese newspaper Hochi says today:

"The public determination is fixed, material burdens are as nothing and the Japanese people are RESIGNED TO ANY SUFFERING."

That's a pretty good description of what wars of conquest mean.

RUMORS that Russian-Finnish peace negotiations are in progress have become so persistent that today German "authorized quarters" come out with this statement:

"When you are fighting Bolshevism you can not simply break

OUT OUR WAY

off the battle when you have achieved certain military objectives." That sounds like notice to the Finns that they can't quit fighting, because Germany WON'T STAND FOR IT.

ON the home front, a special congressional economy committee reports it is virtually unanimous in the belief that a billion dollars a year can be cut from non-defense spending.

Asked to specify ways and means, Treasury Secretary Morgenthau, a member of the committee, suggests sharp curtailment in HIGHWAY and farm appropriations.

This suggests, in its turn that Secretary Morgenthau is not in sympathy with curtailment of non-defense spending, and so proposes to start the cutting with the two items most certain to meet with opposition.

Sen. Norris to Retire, Glass Will Run Again

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—One Senate veteran, Senator Norris (Ind.-Neb.), announced today he would retire when his present term expired in January, 1943, while another, Senator Glass (D-Va.), said that he would run again next year.

The 83-year-old Glass, who came to the senate 21 years ago, said in an interview that "I expect to run again; I will run if I am still living."

Norris, who will round out 46 years of congressional service with the expiration of his present term, told reporters that "I know now that my ability to work and carry on is decreasing."

"I do not feel," the 80-year-old Nebraskan continued, "that I would be doing justice to my state or nation by trying to hold office after my usefulness has disappeared. A man reaches the age when he is unable to do the work of the senate. I feel that I have reached that period in my life."

Norris is the only remaining member who cast a senate vote against American entry into the World war.

Music will be furnished by the choir and soloists of the Baptist church.

20 Years Given Unwed Woman Who Slew Baby

SPOKANE, Nov. 17 (AP)—Patty King, 23-year-old unwed mother, today was sentenced to not more than 20 years in the state penitentiary for the second degree murder of her newborn babe early this month.

The young woman, who was arrested early this month after the baby's body was found in an apartment house garbage chute and who had confessed to slaying the child with a tack hammer shortly after birth, pleaded guilty at arraignment.



U. S. Bans Reports Of Navy Sinking Of Nazi U-Boats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—The navy emphasized today that officers and men are prohibited from reporting even to their own families whether their ships have sunk any German submarines.

The navy's announcement followed a statement by Senator Wheeler (D. Mont.) that a letter from a seaman on the Cruiser St. Louis indicated that the United States navy is engaged in aggressive warfare in the Pacific as well as the Atlantic.

It also followed publication of another letter in which a seaman reported that one submarine had been sunk and two captured by American warships in the Atlantic.

Those disclosing such information violate long-standing regulations and "are subject to disciplinary action," officials said. They circulated a reminder of regulations issued when President Roosevelt declared a limited national emergency at the start of the European war.

Secretary Knox has announced there will be no confirmation or denial of reported sinkings and the president has concurred in the policy.

Wheeler made public a letter which he said was sent from a seaman on the St. Louis at Honolulu October 25 to his mother in Tennessee. It reported that the cruiser's mission had been to take a convoy of oil tankers to Vladivostok.

Sen. Nye Thinks G. O. P. Should Be Rid of Wilkie

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Senator Taft (R. Ohio) said today that republicans might stake their chances of winning control of the house in next year's elections on a pledge to the voters that the party would reject all proposals for sending an American expeditionary force abroad.

Senator Nye (R. N. D.), like Taft an opponent of administration foreign policy, expressed the view that his party's chances next year "depend a great deal on how well we succeed in getting rid of Wendell L. Wilkie and his crowd."

"Mr. Wilkie and his associates have created a lack of confidence in the party," Nye told reporters. "If he is actively in the picture, then I think we may lose some seats we otherwise would gain."

Wilkie, the 1940 republican presidential nominee, consistently has supported administration foreign policy and has urged the party to do likewise, but a majority of republicans in congress have regularly voted against it.

The Ohio senator, an unsuccessful contender for the 1940 republican presidential nomination, said that close congressional votes on administration foreign policy issues demonstrated that there was a great deal of sentiment in the country against sending American boys to fight in foreign countries.
