Mrs. Beth Hinsdale has been visiting in Portland for several days this week also attending to business matters pertaining to the beauty shop business.

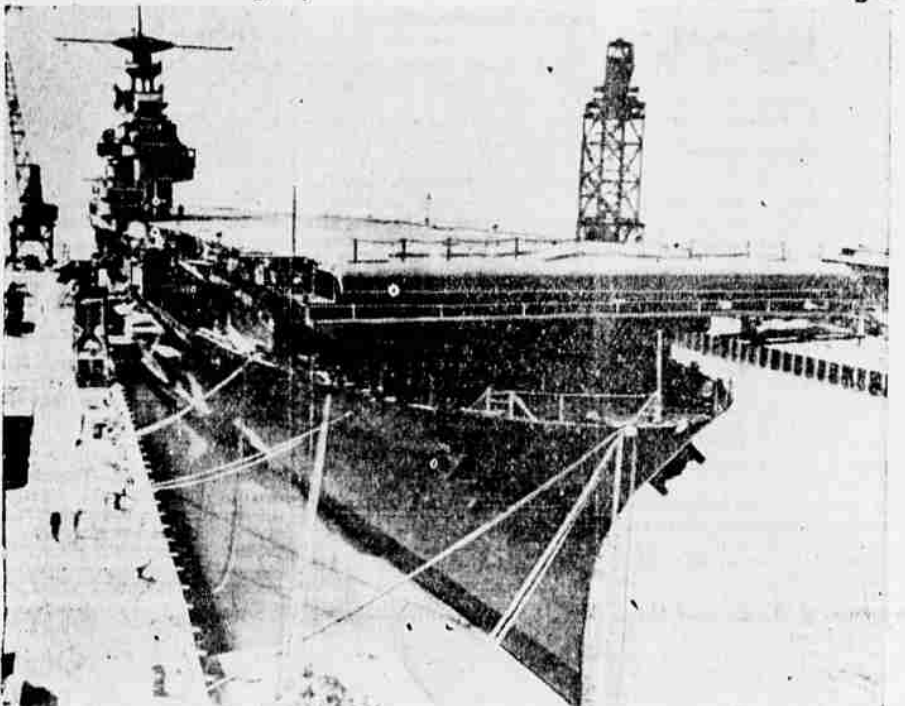
