

Security Wage Reports are Ready

Wage earners whose jobs are covered by the social security act were reminded today that a statement of wages credited to their accounts may be obtained from the social security board and that any errors in the account for employment in 1937, the first year of the act's operation, must be corrected before the end of this year.

Carl D. Monroe, manager of the board's Eugene office, explained that the law limits the time within which errors or omissions in a worker's account can be corrected to four years after the year in which the wages were received.

This means, Monroe said, that if an employee finds the amount credited to his social security account for 1937 is incorrect or incomplete, the worker has until the end of this year to get an adjustment made by filing proof of the correct amount with the social security board.

The Eugene office of the social security board, located in the Postoffice building, will on request furnish a postcard form on which the workers may apply for a statement of his account.

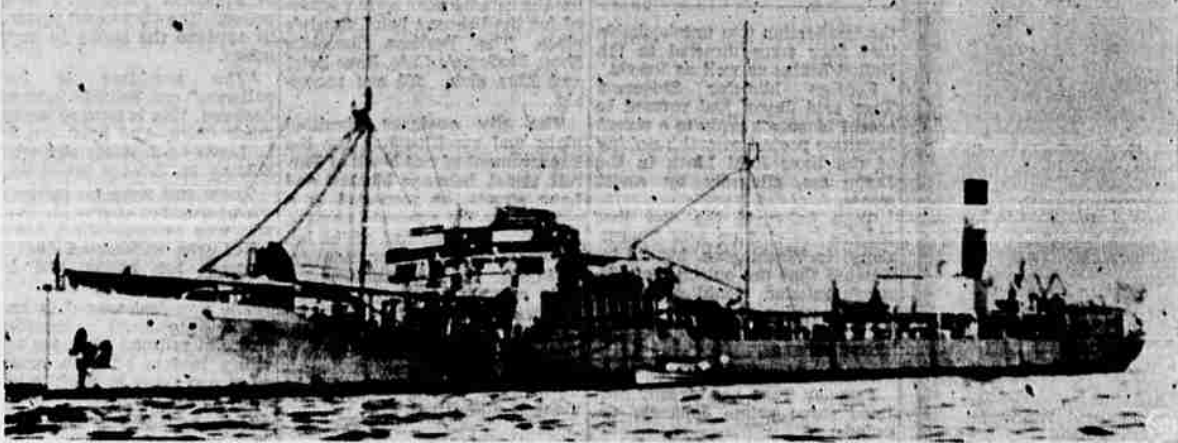

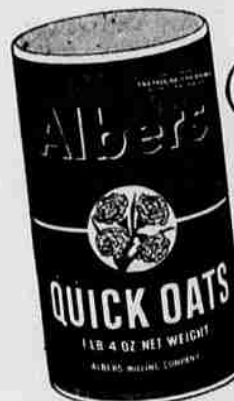
