Crippled R. H. S. Team To Battle Ashland Nov. 20th

The Roseburg high school football team, scheduled to play a Thanksgiving day game with the strong Ashland team, which recently provided one of the season's upsets by beating Medford, will go into the contest in a badly crippled state. Coach Jim Davis reported today. Bert Young, who has been one of the outstanding passers and punters in state high school circles this year, is reported suffering from a severe cold and will be unable to make the trip. Lee Wimberly, halfback, who has been one of the best pass receivers on the team, is suffering from a bruised knee and probably will be able to play only a part of the game. Harold Caey and Jim Ferguson, halfback and guard, also are on the sick list.

Bill Hohenstein, promising sophomore, will probably take over Young's duties, Davis said. Hohenstein so far has had little chance to show his ability, but has exhibited much promise in the few times he has substituted for Young. He is better than average as a kicker and is a hard blocker and fast ball carrier. However, he is light and so far has not compared with Young in pass hurling ability. Hallcraft, also a sophomore, will replace Wimberly.

Other Reserves Slated.

Other players from the reserves expected to see a good deal of action against Ashland, will be Gillam, running guard; Coats, left guard, both sophomores, and Knigge, right tackle, and Krell, right end, both freshmen. Coach Davis reports that the circumstances will give a good opportunity to provide experience for these players, who are expected to join next year in giving the Roseburg high school one of its best football teams, as only two players, Tony Anderson and Marcus Wells, will be lost by graduation.

The Indians will play Ashland in a game starting at 11 a. m. The squad of 19 players, manager and coaches will leave for Ashland by school bus Wednesday afternoon and will spend the night at Ashland.

Thanksgiving On Nov. 20 Proclaimed By Pres. Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(AP) President Roosevelt asked the American people to observe Thanksgiving with "prayers for a speedy end to strife and the establishment on earth of freedom, brotherhood and justice for enduring time," in a proclamation setting November 20 as the date of the observance.

The text of the proclamation follows:

"I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate and set aside Thursday, the twentieth day of November, 1941, as a day to be observed in giving thanks to the heavenly source of our earthly blessings.

"Our beloved country is free and strong, our moral and physical defenses against the forces of threatened aggression are mounting daily in magnitude and effectiveness.

"In the interest of our own future, we are sending succor to increasing pace to those peoples abroad who are bravely defending their homes and their precious liberties against annihilation.

"We have not lost our faith in the spiritual dignity of man, our proud belief in the right of all people to live out their lives in freedom and with equal treatment. The love of democracy still burns brightly in our hearts. "We are grateful to the father of us all for the innumerable daily manifestations of his beneficent mercy in affairs both public and private, for the bounties of the harvest, for opportunities to labor and to serve, and for the continuance of those homely joys and satisfactions which enrich our lives.

"Let us ask the divine blessing on our decision and determine to protect our way of life against the forces of evil and slavery which seek in these days to encompass us.

"On the day appointed for this purpose, let us reflect at our homes or places of worship on the goodness of God and, in giving thanks, let us pray for a speedy end to strife and the establishment on earth of freedom, brotherhood, and justice for enduring time."

during time." The 16 states which will observe Thanksgiving on the last Thursday—this year November 27—are Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, and Vermont.

Immunization Clinics Slated by County Health Unit

Two immunization clinics have been scheduled this week by the county health unit. Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer, reported today. A clinic will be held Wednesday morning at the Edenbower school, with children from Garden Valley and Riverdale attending. Toxoid, Schick test, tuberculosis test and smallpox vaccination will be given all children desiring them. Dr. Wainwright and Hazel Lytle, nurse, will conduct the clinic.

A general immunization clinic will be held at the health office in the courthouse Friday. These clinics usually are held on Thursday, but will be conducted Friday of this week because of the Thanksgiving holiday. Because of extra work due to the prevalence of disease throughout the county, the health nurses, it is reported, are spending a greater number of hours in field work, and persons desiring to contact the nurses at the health unit office are asked to call prior to 9:30 a. m.

Suspect Held in Poison Deaths of 11 Elephants

ST. PETERSBURG, FLA., Nov. 18.—(AP)—A train crew employee of the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey circus is under arrest here in connection with the poisoning death of 11 circus elephants, valued at \$125,000.

Detective chief John C. Siers said the man, listed as E. B. Michael of Graettinger, Iowa, was held on an open charge for investigation pending arrival of a warrant from Charlotte, N. C. Detective chief Frank Littlejohn of Charlotte asserted there the warrant charged Michael with poisoning 10 elephants on or about Nov. 3, when the circus played in Charlotte.
