

C. I. O. President Joins With Union In Backing F. R.

DETROIT, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The CIO's national convention extended "all out" endorsement of President Roosevelt's aid to Britain policy in a resolution yesterday after four hours of discussion.

The resolution was adopted by a standing vote, which was called unanimous, although most of the delegates representing the United Mine Workers and the United Construction Workers Organizing committee remained seated.

Among those not voting was A. D. Lewis, brother of President John L. Lewis of the striking mine workers and head of the construction workers union.

The non-voting delegates ignored an eleventh-hour appeal of CIO President Philip Murray, himself vice-president of the mine workers. Murray recalled his own part in the current mine strike and in mine strikes of the past, declaring:

"Yes, I've been in the battle-front. I take second place to no living soul."

Murray, dwelling upon his long connection with Lewis, his predecessor as CIO chieftain, assured miner delegates of his "affection, love and admiration" for their president and offered, in the present captive mine dispute, to place himself "at the beck and call of President Lewis and my union."

"Never have I betrayed them," Murray declared, "and so help me God, I never shall betray them."

He restated his support of a union shop, which striking miners are seeking, and which was voted unanimously by the convention in yesterday's opening session, but declared his stand did not alter his belief that labor's united support of "all out" aid for foes of Hitler was essential to labor's own interests.

Corn Growers Of Douglas Urged to Exhibit at Show

Douglas county corn growers are requested to prepare exhibits for the 5th annual Oregon State corn show to be held at Corvallis December 12 and 13. Separate classes have been provided for open pollinated and hybrid corn. In the open pollinated class a 10-ear exhibit is required, and for the hybrid class 20 ears are required, 10 of which will be shelled to determine the shelling percentage.

Exhibitors from Douglas county this year will compete with corn growers of Jackson, Josephine, and all counties east of the Cascades. In past years the southern Oregon has been in a separate district and has not had to compete with the corn growing sections of eastern Oregon or the Willamette valley.

Exhibits should be selected with care whether they are entered in the open pollinated class or the hybrid class. Each 10 ears should be uniform in length, diameter, color, kernel type and general appearance. Medium sized ears are better than small or overly large ears. All ears should be well matured and free of discoloration or injured kernels. It is not advisable, states J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent, to place ears to be exhibited in an extremely hot room or over a stove, as the ears will dry out too quickly and give a dead appearance to the corn. Where the corn contains too much moisture it is advisable to place it in a warm but well ventilated room until it is thoroughly dried.

Farmers interested in exhibiting at the state corn show are requested to get in touch with the county agent's office, as arrangements will be made to send all exhibits to the corn show and have the exhibits returned without cost to the growers.

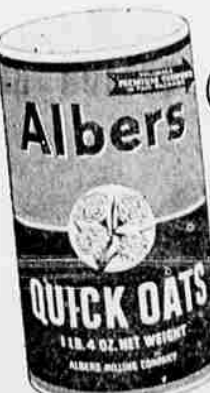

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Bill Would Bar Taxation of U. S. Defense Program

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Rep. Cochran (D-Mo.) introduced yesterday a bill to exempt the federal government's defense program from sales taxes and similar levies imposed by state and local laws.

The Missourian said the legislation, if enacted, would save the government several hundred million dollars in such taxes which otherwise under a new supreme court ruling would have to be paid for sale, purchase, storage, use or consumption of tangible property for use in carrying out defense contracts.

"I cannot conceive how any state can expect the government to pay sales and use taxes when the vast amount of money that is being expended for national defense purposes is for the security of the country as a whole, which, of course, includes the forty-eight states," Cochran said. Senator Thomas (D-Okla.) said the supreme court decision would enable states having sales and use taxes to collect more than \$50,000,000 in back taxes from the government on work done and supplies used under contracts let on a cost-plus-fee basis.

"If the states insist on levying such taxes, then the amount that the government will be liable to under existing appropriations will run well over \$100,000,000," Thomas said in a statement.

Thanksgiving Eats Higher in Price, Statistics Show

By FRANKLIN MULLIN CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The traditional Thanksgiving feast, of deepest significance this year, will cost Americans more than at any festivity in the past decade, food price statistics indicated today.

Measured in the cost of the various food items, market experts estimated probably 16 per cent more cash must be laid on the counter to get the same basketful which, a year ago, came at a bargain.

There's hardly an item that's not more expensive, except possibly a few vegetables and "trimmings." Cranberries are priced about the same as a year ago in the Chicago wholesale market. Some poultry are only slightly higher, particularly ducks and geese which, wholesale dressed, are up 6 to 7 per cent. Turkeys were up about 20 per cent. Some spices are sharply higher and relatively scarce.

Trade analysis indicated that in general retail prices have lagged behind the advance in wholesale markets. In instances, while some foods are costing dealers more than a year ago, figures posted at counters, are little, if any higher.

The bureau of labor statistics November 8 index of wholesale food prices for the country as a whole was 23.8 per cent higher than a year ago. Important items which were higher in the Chicago wholesale market today included butter, up about 12 per cent, eggs, up 60 per cent, lard 100 per cent, flour 20 per cent and cheese 45 per cent.

The bureau's index for retail food costs just a month ago was only 16 per cent higher than a year earlier but was the highest since January, 1931.

Slugs Damaging Vetch and Clover; Poison Available

Garden slugs are causing considerable damage to fall seeded vetch and clovers, according to J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent. Growers of these crops have reported during the past few days that a considerable acreage of vetch and crimson clover has been completely killed out by slugs, and unless the damage can be stopped there will undoubtedly be complete loss of some plantings.

The poison for the control of slugs found to be most effective is composed of metaldehyde and calcium arsenate as the active ingredients with a bran carrier. The poison is available in both loose and pellet form, both giving equally good results, with the pellet form apparently being somewhat more effective and more economical. Both types are broadcast over the area infested with slugs either by hand or with a horn-type seeder. The

loose material is applied at approximately 10 pounds per acre, while the pellets are effective when applied at the rate of 4 pounds per acre. The pellet form costs slightly more per pound but the acre cost is materially less.

Heavy or continuous rains reduce the effectiveness of the poison, although better kills are obtained in humid weather when slugs are more active rather than in dry, sunny periods. A series of mild winters plus an abundant late summer and early fall rains apparently is favorable for the development of slugs and the reason for serious infestations at this time.
