Ferde Grofe, famous American conductor, composer and arranger, will direct the San Francisco Symphony orchestra in the Standard Symphony hour broadcast Thursday over KRRR and the Don Lee net from 8 to 9 p. m.

Mr. Grofe has had a distinguished career, conducting with great success such symphonic groups as the Hollywood Bowl orchestra and the Philadelphia orchestra. Seniors of R. H. S. Receive Pamphlet On Democracy

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 19.—Every high school senior in Roseburg will this week be given a copy of "Calling the Youth of the Nation," a 30-page pamphlet just released by the state system of higher education in cooperation with the state department of education and the state curriculum committee, according to announcement of the school of education at the University of Oregon.

A recent survey made by the educational policies commission of the teaching of democracy and citizenship in American high schools revealed an incomplete understanding of the democratic way of life on the part of high school boys and girls.

When asked what democracy meant to them, only 27 per cent voluntarily recognized their obligations and responsibilities. They were completely loyal to

democracy and anxious to defend it, but there was need for more thorough and systematic instruction as to the nature of the social, political and economic system which they are asked to defend. "Calling the Youth of the Nation" is a simplified high school version of the latest publication of the educational policies commission, "The Education of Free Man in American Democracy," which attempts to provide the fundamental understandings of democracy today and to analyze the dangers which threaten it.

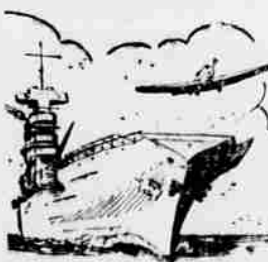
