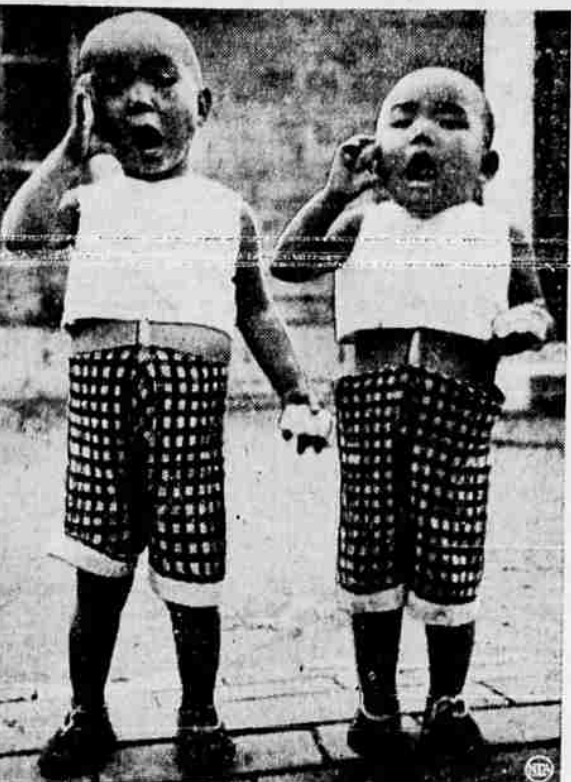

Pal's Plea Fails To Save Car Thief

SEATTLE, Nov. 19. (AP)—A federal court jury convicted Albert Fries, 28, Fresno, Calif., last night of complicity in driving a stolen automobile from Eugene, Ore., to Forks, Clallam county, despite a co-defendant's attempt to clear him.

Harold T. Connolly, 29, also of Fresno, who had pleaded guilty, testified Fries did not participate in the theft and did not know the car had been stolen.

Assistant United States Attorney Gerald D. Hile argued it would have been impossible for Connolly to steal the car alone, change the license plates and drive that distance, suffering from a bullet wound which Connolly said he had suffered in fleeing Fresno police July 17. The two men were arrested at Forks. Sentence will be imposed Monday.

Army Engineer Unit Tarries in Roseburg
