Approximately 500 communities in thirty-eight states now release public school pupils during school hours for religious education, according to a survey just completed by the United States office of education in cooperation with the international council of religious education. The survey, published in booklet form, lists the number of elementary and high school pupils attending week-day classes of religious education at 164,013 in 337 school systems. Commenting on the fact that the program is operative in thirty-eight states, the survey points out that in cases where state law is silent on the subject, the question of whether public school children may be released for religious education is usually determined by the appropriate school officials in accordance with general provisions of the law. The attorney generals of four states have vetoed the release-time plan. Viz.: California, Missouri, Oregon and Washington. New York state leads the nation with fifty-nine schools in large cities. Plans for making the American public "religious education conscious" were laid in Chicago when executives of twenty Protestant denominations met under the auspices of the international council of religious education. "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Amen.
