

Parley On Railway Strike Continued

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Representatives of the railroads and of railway labor acceded yesterday to a suggestion by President Roosevelt that they confer here Friday in another effort to avert a threatened strike on the rail lines.

The president made that proposal at his second conference of the day with railway executives, union officials and interested representatives of the government.

After the White House conference, Joseph B. Eastman, chairman of the interstate commerce commission, said that he had been authorized to announce that the "duly accredited representatives of the two parties concerned will meet and confer on this matter Friday afternoon."

Asked whether a definite formula had been presented which might lead to a settlement, Eastman said he could not say anything about that. But George Harrison, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, said there had been no definite proposals or suggestions made beyond the one that negotiations continue Friday.

Neither Eastman nor Harrison was willing to predict that a settlement might be obtained Friday although they indicated they were hopeful of progress.

Sen. Pepper Urges Defiance of Japan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) said yesterday that Saburo Kurusu, Japan's special envoy, should know that "if war in the Pacific is the price of resisting the Japanese rampage then war will have to come."

Pepper, a member of the senate foreign relations committee, told reporters that Kurusu, who has been conferring with President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull on the Far Eastern situation, "should understand that this country has gone as far as we are going."

"The time has come to draw a line," Pepper said. "If the Japanese don't like it they can lump it. We have watched them murder and rape and ravage a large part of the earth. We have seen them encroach on our interests, foot by foot, yard by yard and mile by mile."

"If they want peace, let them stop their aggression; let them get out of China. America will not acquiesce in any so-called 'new order' which is built of the bones and washed of the blood of innocent victims."

Picketed Salem Cafe Accuses Truck Concern

SALEM, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Salem cafe in Salem, picketed since last summer by the Salem local 452 of the AFL, culinary alliance, filed complaint with the public utilities commissioner yesterday asking for suspension of the common carrier permit of the Pacific Truck Express, on grounds that the truck company refused to make deliveries to the restaurant.

The cafe took similar action four years ago against two other truck firms, and the commissioner then ordered that deliveries be made.

Aluminum Factory to Rise Near Portland

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(AP)—An aluminum fabricating plant will be built on a 115-acre tract at Fairview, Ore., east of Portland, bought by the Defense Plant Corporation.

The United Engineering & Foundry Co., Pittsburgh, has the contract for the \$22,000,000 plant which will be operated under lease by the Aluminum Company of America.

The plant will use 35,000 kilowatts of Bonneville power and have a capacity of 60,000,000 pounds of sheet aluminum annually.

Distance Trophy Posted For Oakland Turkey Show

The Roseburg chamber of commerce is to donate a trophy to the entry from the greatest distance at the Northwestern Turkey show at Oakland, Dec. 9-13. It was announced today by Harry Pinniger, secretary. The trophy will be in the form of a myrtlewood lamp, which will be fitted with a specially engraved silver plate.

Wildlife Meet To Stress Fisheries

The progress of science in the conservation and development of fishing resources will be stressed at the sixth annual conference of the Oregon Wildlife federation, to be held at Oregon State college December 1 and 2, according to William J. Smith, Portland, president of the federation.

One of the main visiting speakers will be Charles E. Jackson of Washington, D. C., assistant director in charge of fisheries research for the federal fish and wildlife service. Mr. Jackson, one of the nation's outstanding ichthyologists, will represent Ira N. Gabrielson, chief of the federal fish and wildlife service, at the meeting.

Another specialist in this field who will attend is Paul R. Needham, associate aquatic biologist of the United States bureau of fisheries, who has been making a study of Oregon and California fishing streams. He made special studies of the streams of southwestern Oregon this past summer.

Representatives of 120 conservation and sportsmen's organizations will make up the official delegates at the conference, although the sessions are open to the general public. Conferences in the past have given rise to definite action on the part of Oregon's fish and game administrators, and by the legislature, President Smith points out.

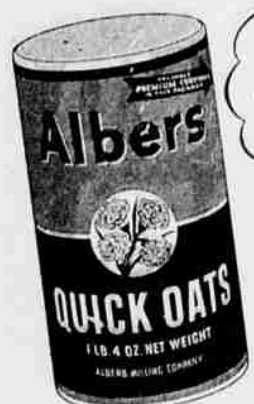
Army Recruiter to Be In Roseburg This Week
