**Roseburg Charge Awaits Woman Ending Pen Term**  
Mrs. E. A. Sloan, now in the Jackson county jail on a check conviction in Jackson county is to be brought to Roseburg Monday to answer here to complaints charging obtaining money by false pretenses through issuance of worthless checks. ### R. H. S. Indians Lose to Ashland Gridders, 32 to 7

The Roseburg high school Indians, playing their last football game of the season, were beaten 32 to 7 at Ashland in a Thanksgiving day game, which was a better contest than the series would indicate.

Roseburg was held on the Ashland six-inch line early in the game, and later had a touchdown play called back by an offside penalty. The lone Roseburg tally came late in the game when the team mixed passes and ground plays for an 80-yard drive which culminated with Marcus Wells shunting off tackle for the touchdown. A stiff breeze gave Ashland a great advantage in punting during the first quarter, as Roseburg was kicking against the wind, and by rains on the exchange of punts the Lithians were able to gain a 13 to 0 lead. Bob Holmquist, star quarterback, suffered an injury in the second quarter and was unable to play during the balance of the contest, weakening the center of the line. Ashland took advantage of this situation to punch power plays into the line for long gains in the second half, alternating with passes when the Roseburg defense drew in to plug the hole at center.

on labor legislation," a reporter inquired. There is no news on that, the chief executive responded. The new Pennsylvania discorders came after 50 or 75 carloads of United Mine Workers had driven from the nearby Washington county to the vicinity of the H. C. Frick Company's Liberty mine. Valley after valley of snags could be heard.

The ten wounded men, who identified themselves as pickets, were treated at hospitals a Pittsburgh report said. One of them, John Stephanik, 36, of Coal Center, claimed the pickets were waylaid by non-union men. "We were ambushed near the company store and shot down without warning," said Stephanik, who was shot in the hip. Sympathy Strikes Spread The Frick company, a subsidiary of U. S. Steel, operates nearly a score of mines in Fayette county and has claimed 25 per cent of normal production since the UMW called the strike Monday to enforce its demands for a union shop in the captive coal mines in six states. Union of Miners say about 300 miners out of a normal force of about 33,000 are working at Frick mines.

Sympathy strikes in commercial mines, not covered by the strike all had spread to 75 Pennsylvania pits, employing 46,000 men while between 25,000 and 28,000 miners were involved in the captive mine walkout. Steel companies own the captive mines and use their output while the product of commercial mines is sold on the open market. Carnegie-Illinois Steel corp., chief operating subsidiary of United States Steel corp., today announced the shutdown of five additional blast furnaces for lack of coal supplies. These are in addition to the six furnaces already closed down by the captive coal mine strike.

The blast furnaces affected include two at the Blairton works, Blairton, Pa., and one each at the Ohio works, Youngstown, Ohio; the Carrie furnaces at Rankin, Pa., and the Duquesne furnaces at Duquesne, Pa.

**NAZIS CLAIM STAGGERING LOSSES DEALT RUSSIANS**  
BERLIN, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Authorized German sources said today that 10,000,000 Russians had been killed, wounded or captured in the five months of war with the soviet union, ended today. The figure was cited in what they termed a "survey of Hitler's strategy in the East."  
The Germans listed 3,782,000 prisoners. The Germans said that 15,877 Russian planes had been captured or destroyed, 27,452 tanks destroyed or captured and 27,129 guns seized or smashed. Also listed as destroyed were 52 Russian warships, with 59 damaged, and 138 merchantships sunk and 137 damaged.
