Tuberculosis Data Given on Eve of Seal Sale Opening

Approximately 150 cases of tuberculosis have been treated in Douglas county during the past 10 years, it was announced today by officers of the Douglas County Health association on the eve of the opening of the annual Christmas seal sale. An interesting spot map, on which the tuberculosis cases are shown by colored pins, was placed on display today at the Pioneer drug store as a means of acquainting the public with the work the association has done with seal sale money raised in past years.

At the present time, it is shown on the map, Douglas county has 13 tubercular patients now in hospitals and sanitariums. There are approximately 125 cases that have been arrested or are being given occasional treatment, or are being kept under observation. Twelve deaths have been recorded during the 10-year period covered by the report.

Tuberculosis seals will go on sale Tuesday, it is reported. Following the same plan as in past years, seals will be mailed to previous contributors, who will be asked to return their contributions by mail. Direct sales also will be conducted during the next few weeks. Every effort is being made to increase the per capita contributions and the total returns, as greatly increased costs are anticipated during the coming year. As one factor indicating greater expense, is the fact that the cost of x-ray examinations has been doubled due to shortage of materials.

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Fire caused \$200,000 damage at the Sunfreeze Ice Cream plant here yesterday.
