EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Coach Tex Oliver awaited word from doctors today to learn whether Ray Segale, guard and one of the mainstays of the Oregon line, would be able to play against Oregon state Saturday.

Segale's shoulder, injured in the Washington game, was to be x-rayed.

Oliver said it was doubtful whether Bill Regner, end, and Elliott Wilson, center, would be able to play. Neither appeared against Washington.

Minor injuries are numerous, Oliver said, and but one heavy practice is slated for the week.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 25.—(AP)—Oregon State's Beavers engaged in a heavy workout today in preparation for the annual contest against Oregon Saturday.

The already vaunted Oregon State defense will get further polishing up this week, Coach Lon Stiner said.

Stiner said Oregon would outweight the Beavers, but that he hoped to stop the Webfoots' offense with shifting defense tactics.

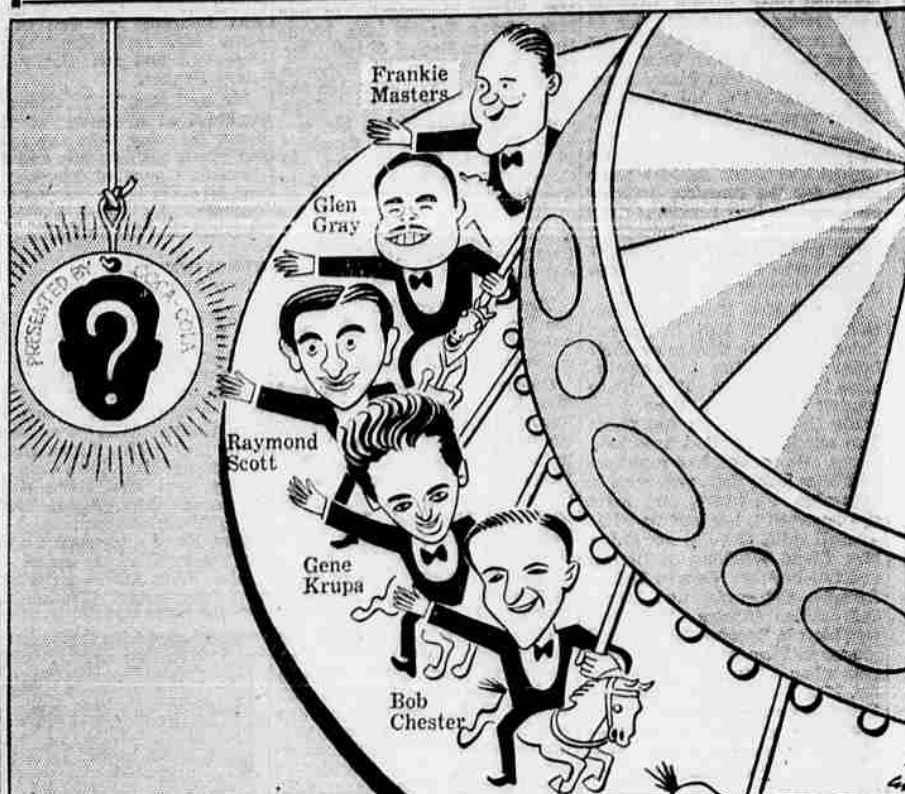
