Ex-Roseburg Man Marks 40 Years As Ship's Baker

George H. Church, former resident of Roseburg, has rounded out 40 years of service as a ship's baker, according to an article appearing in "The Bliss Bugle," a mimeographed newspaper published aboard the U. S. army transport Tasker H. Bliss, of which Mr. Church now is a crew member.

George Church is a brother of Howard B. Church of Roseburg and with another brother, Milton, now deceased, was in business here for several years in the Church Brothers bakery, which later became the Model bakery. According to "The Bliss Bugle," "he has been to every port of importance in the world, and was chief baker on the first oil burning ship to ply the Pacific. This ship was the SS Alameda, sailing from San Francisco to Honolulu. The USAF Tasker H. Bliss is not the first troop ship Church has sailed on. Thirty-nine years ago he was baker on the Sherman. He also sailed on the Washington, where he celebrated his sixtieth birthday. From the Washington, Church boarded the Tasker H. Bliss and accompanied her on the first transport job and has been chief baker since. Church adds that he "expects to retire at sea."

Sprague Asks Return of Alleged K-Falls Killer

SALEM, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Governor Sprague said today he has asked the extradition of George Parks from Great Falls, Mont., to Klamath Falls, where Parks is charged with slaying Dr. Salem David last March 16.

Dr. David was slain while he wrestled with one of two gunmen who had robbed a luncheon near his home. Sheriff Low at Klamath Falls said the gunmen fled, but that one later was identified as Parks through an automobile license application.

No "Warm-Up" Exemption

SALEM, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Automobile dealers are not entitled to exemption from taxes on gasoline they use to "warm up" motors in their garages, the attorney general ruled yesterday. The opinion held that if the dealers obtained such exemption, then every person in the state who warms up his car in his garage each morning would be entitled to exemption for the amount of gas used.
