A. A. A. Program Meetings Dated In Douglas County

The 1942 Agricultural Conservation program got under way December 1, according to J. Roland Parker, secretary of the Agricultural Conservation association for Douglas county. Thrift in Food Smart, Patriotic; Heed Pkg. Labels

It is both smart and patriotic to be thrifty these days when food waste is frowned upon both by the government and by one's bank account. Representative of the government's consumer division are now circulating pledge blanks on which one promises to avoid waste in managing a home. Much waste can be avoided by planning meals ahead of time, points out Miss Lucy A. Case, extension nutritionist at Oregon State college. Wise buyers base their shopping plans on advance meal plans, although these may be changed in the light of unexpected opportunities found at the store. Improper storage is another food thief, says Miss Case. For instance, left-over fat and drippings are valuable if stored in a cool dry place, while otherwise they will be spoiled themselves and will ruin the flavor of other foods.

Waste also occurs in food preparation if vegetables are peeled too thick, oranges or lemons only partially squeezed, and outside leaves of lettuce or cabbage thrown away as a matter of habit. Poor cooking and serving are other sources of waste of the food itself and of vitamins and minerals it contains.

Label Reading Saves Money.

Time spent in a grocery store reading the labels on packages will give good returns in money saved these days, Miss Case points out. More and more manufacturers are now putting grade labels on canned goods, as well as net contents. These two items observed together can save the buyer money and avoid disappointment, says Miss Case.

Because some folks have difficulty in comparing the values in different sized packages, even when weights are given, the extension service has prepared a pocket folder containing cost-weight tables from which a person can determine at a glance the cost per pound of any material if given the price per package and weight in ounces. This cost-weight bulletin, No. 501, may be obtained from any extension office.
