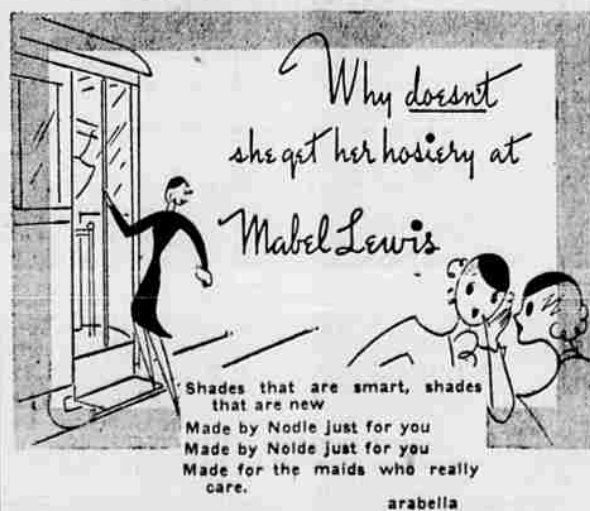
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Council Advances Funds To Meet Armory Deficit

The sum of \$100 has been advanced by the city council to the special committee in charge of the Roseburg armory to meet a deficit incurred in the making of necessary improvements. The armory was surrendered by the state of Oregon to the city of Roseburg at the time the national guard was called into active service. Control was placed in the

hands of a committee, headed by V. J. Micelli.

At the present time the federal government has contracted with the city for rental of a part of the building, and the sum of \$300 in rent for that portion of the building now used as an air warning service filter center is expected to be paid in the near future. The council has ordered an advance of \$100 from general funds to meet existing indebtedness prior to the receipt of the rental payment from the federal government.
