Pinniger Slated On Defense Forum

SALEM, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Civilian defense coordinators of Oregon's 36 counties will meet here December 15 for a school of instruction and a round table discussion, Governor Sprague said today.

"Developments in the far east may have reached a crisis by that time and the latest government instructions for dealing with that emergency will be available at this conference," Governor Sprague said. Speakers will include Joseph K. Carson, Jr., Portland, inspector general of civilian defense for the west coast; Mayor Earl Riley of Portland, area director of civilian defense; Ray W. Gill, state grandmaster and Oregon's representative on the voluntary participation committee appointed by President Roosevelt; and Dr. W. W. Baum, Salem, president of the Oregon State Medical society. Frank Hull of Medford, Harry Pinniger of Roseburg, and Bryan Conley of Salem, county coordinators, will direct a forum of organization problems, while Edward L. Boatright, Multnomah county coordinator, will discuss air raid precautions, blackouts, and incendiary bomb protection.
