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empty of tricks. Churchill warns that if they are stopped in Russia, the Germans will be likely to turn on Britain in full fury.

But keep in mind that bottling Hitler up in Europe is the big objective.

ON the home front, Senator George (of Georgia) says he is convinced the cost of the defense program will have to be spread over two or more generations by borrowing which may boost the national debt to 150 billion dollars.

He says he is informed that federal expenditures for the calendar year beginning January 1, 1942, will probably aggregate 36 billions while tax receipts are not expected to exceed 16 billions. That will mean a 20 billion dollar deficit in one year.

THE defense effort, of course, has to be gone through with. There's no way out of that.

But let's keep in mind that the debt we are piling up will be contracted with INFLATED dollars whereas the payment of it will have to be made with DEFLATED dollars.

If you came out of the 1929 depression heavily in debt, you will know what that means.

REPEATING, for purposes of emphasis:

We can't pull our punches on the defense effort. That has to be carried through, no matter what the cost.

But we should (and probably MUST, if we are to avoid national bankruptcy) cut off EVERY POSSIBLE DOLLAR of non-defense spending.

An interest-bearing government security issued in many denominations from \$18.75 to \$10,000 (cost price) for the convenience of all types of savers and investors in lending their money direct to the government for national defense. Q. What are Defense Savings Stamps? A. Stamps selling for 10 cents to \$5 each, and always redeemable at their face value, enabling people to save money systematically in small amounts for the purchase of defense savings bonds. Note—To buy Defense Bonds and Stamps, go to the nearest post office, bank, or savings and loan association; or write to the treasurer of the United States, Washington, D. C. Also Stamps are now on sale at retail stores.

The greatest argument in favor of Christianity is a Christian. The best proof of the divinity of Jesus is that He makes dead men live. The story of a young foreigner, an evangelist, who visited our city a few years ago. He says: "Christ has redeemed my life from destruction. Thirty-three years ago I came with six companions. We were all of the same age and the same nationality (Jugoslavia). We all began work in the coal fields of Illinois. A few months after landing I gave my heart to Christ. The other six boys refused to have anything to do with Christianity. One night three of them were killed in a drunken brawl. Later the other three killed two men and are now serving life sentences in the penitentiary. Three in their graves, three in the penitentiary, and I am preaching the unsearchable riches of the kingdom of Christ. What better proof do we need that the Christian life is the only kind of life worth living?" (Samuel E. Volovina) There are many ways of measuring a life. Often it is measured by accomplishments, or the multiplicity of things put into it. Look over your life for one day, and see what you have done, and see what you have accomplished. I count this thing to be grandly true; that a noble deed is a step toward God. Lifting the soul from the common clod, to a purer air and a broader view, upward, onward, toward God. Amen.
