SAN JOSE, Calif., Dec. 9.—(AP)—Members of two mainland college football teams stranded by war in Hawaii have been assigned to police duty in Honolulu. The teams are those of San Jose State college and Willamette University at Salem, Ore., both of which had December dates with the University of Hawaii as well as with each other. There are 25 in the California squad, one a resident of Hawaii. Willamette took 26 players to the island, and about 20 fans.
