McCallister reports Forecasts McCallister reports. Forecasts may be published and will appear as heretofore unless further re-strictions are applied. Extreme caution is being taken, it is reorted regarding publicative eather information, as data is of great importance to enemy forces engaged in naval or air operations. All radio stations have been under instructions to provide no weather in-formation since war activities were begun.
