## Navy Recruiter Here Suddenly Recalled

B. J. Hall, navy recruiting officer, who arrived in Roseburg Tuesday on official duties, was suddenly recalled to Eugene last night and anticipated that he was being called back into active service. He had expected to be in Roseburg until Thursday.

Hall reported that there had been a tremendous rush of volunteers for the navy throughout all of Oregon. The recruiting officer, who had obtained only two hours of sleep since Sunday, handled approximately 20 applications for enlistment while in Roseburg yesterday.

Until further arrangements are made for local service by the recruiting bureau, he stated prior to his departure, enlistments will be handled through the nearest permanent recruiting office, which is at Eugene. The office, there, he states, will be operated 24 hours daily.

## Publication of Data on Weather Is Halted

The U. S. weather bureau in Roseburg has been instructed to cease publication of statistics, it was announced today by J. C. McCallister, meteorologist here. These statistics previously have been published daily in the News-Review, but can no longer be supplied by the weather bureau, Mr. McCallister reports. Forecasts may be published and will appear as heretofore unless further restrictions are applied. Extreme caution is being taken. It is reported regarding publication of weather information, as such data is of great importance to enemy forces engaged in naval or air operations. All radio stations have been under instructions to provide no weather information since war activities were begun.
