

Filter Center's Phone Not for Information

Considerable difficulty is being experienced in keeping telephone lines at the filter center in the Roseburg armory free from communications from individuals seeking information, according to Lieutenant J. T. Runyan, commanding officer. The filter center, Mr. Runyan reports, has no information which it can give to the public concerning blackouts and blackout regulations. Such matters, he reports, are being handled exclusively by the civilian defense headquarters.

He also advises chief observers that any communications regarding organization of observation post crews should be cleared through the department executive, Fred Southwick. The materials, supplies and instructions for chief observers are being mailed out as rapidly as they are received, Lieut. Runyan states, and it is useless to call the filter center. The only messages between the observation posts and the filter center, he states, should concern actual flights of planes.
