Draft Calls On Douglas to Exceed Original Totals

The Douglas county selective service board received word today from Lt. Col. Elmer V. Wooten, state director, that the board must be prepared to fill calls during January far in excess of those previously announced. Unofficial reports indicate that the January call for Oregon may be doubled or tripled. Douglas county's quota for January had been previously announced as 45 men.

The national gross quota has been increased to the point where all available class 1-A men will be required to fill the quota. State quotas are being revised and will be announced in approximately two weeks.

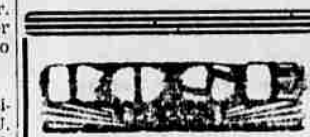
In order that the local board is prepared to fill the increased January calls, it is mandatory that every effort be made to expedite the physical examination of all tentative Class 1 men immediately.

Any official announcement of the size of the increase in the January call will be communicated to the local board as soon as it is received, Col. Wooten said.
