The Douglas County Health association announced today that Christmas seal booths will be installed in the postoffice and in the United States National bank for the convenience of shoppers. The bank booth will later be transferred to the Douglas National bank.

Persons who have received seals through the mail are asked to return the money as soon as possible, as some confusion has resulted.

The association points out that the Christmas seal sale is not a Red Cross function, but proceeds are used entirely in the prevention and treatment of tuberculosis. Many people are under the impression that membership in the Red Cross entitles them to Christmas seals, but this is erroneous, since the two organizations are in no way connected, the association says.

U. S. Declares War on Germany and Italy

(Continued from page 1)

Italy's declaration of war against the United States, with a note accusing the United States of aggression.

Later, Italy's ambassador, Prince Colonna called at the department "to ask for information" and was told that his government had already informed the American charge d'affaires in Rome that Italy considered herself at war with the United States. Colonna asked that measures be taken to permit departure of the embassy staff.

James Dunn, political adviser to the state department, who received Colonna and his first secretary, told them that the United States "had long expected Germany to carry out its threat against this hemisphere and the United States and that we fully anticipated that Italy would obediently follow along."

The German note asserted that American naval vessels "since early September, 1941, have systematically attacked German naval forces."

The note, a copy of the document handed the American charge d'affaires in Berlin, was signed by the German foreign minister von Ribbentrop and stated that the United States had already "virtually created a state of war."

The note recalled that September 11, 1941, President Roosevelt publicly declared that he had "ordered the American navy and air force to shoot on sight at any German war vessel."

It added that Secretary of the Navy Knox "himself confirmed that American destroyers attacked German submarines," and that

"furthermore, the naval forces of the United States, under orders of their government and contrary to international law have treated and seized German merchant vessels on the high seas as enemy ships."

War Forces in Motion.
Meanwhile the United States was calling upon its vast industrial arsenal to "remember Pearl Harbor" and send production soaring.

As OPM tackled the job of performing production miracles, the army completed heavy concentrations of troops along the Pacific and Atlantic coasts to "meet any threat" of a hit-run incursion which might menace the busy plants or civilian security.

The speedy and secret shift of troops was accompanied by a redistribution of air force units to cope with any hostile air activity that might follow the surprise Japanese reconnaissance flights over the San Francisco area Monday night and Tuesday morning.

Hitler, Mussolini Voice
Declarations of War

(By the Associated Press)
Germany and Italy declared war against the United States today with Premier Mussolini telling cheering crowds in Rome that "it is an honor to fight together with the Japanese" while Adolf Hitler declared the war would determine the history of the entire world for the next 500 to 1,000 years.

"Italian men and women, once again I tell you in this great hour; we shall be victorious!" Il Duce shouted from the balcony of the palazzo Venezia in Rome.

Washington had already discounted both declarations by the axis powers with the official comment "so what?" and it appeared that the European dictators were offering Japan moral support rather than any possibility of actual fighting aid.

In Berlin, Hitler told the Reichstag: "This has become the greatest year of decision by the German people—and your greatest decision stands before us."

The twin declarations of war had been foreshadowed, a Japanese spokesman having declared yesterday that "Japan expected Germany and Italy to declare war on the United States" in fulfillment of the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo alliance of totalitarianism against democracy.
