The Sunnydale grange held its annual bazaar at Redford's store on Saturday and the women's council will hold its apron and cooked food sale at the same place December 13.

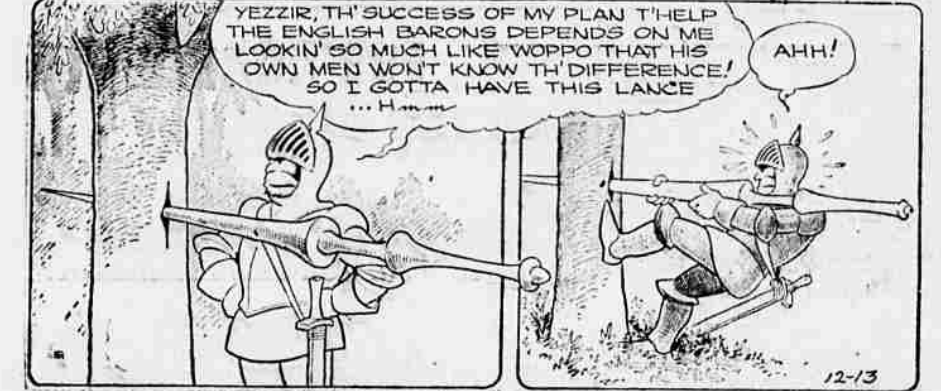

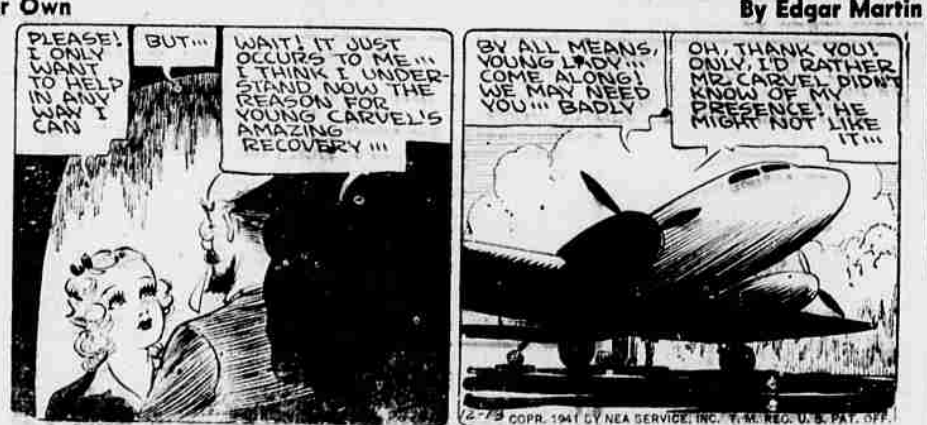
