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Today Is Bill of Rights Day

JUST one hundred and fifty years ago today the state of Virginia ratified the famous Bill of Rights and, since that ratification represented the required three-fourth of the states, the Bill of Rights became the first ten amendments to the constitution of the United States.

The Constitution, written at the Federal Convention in the summer of 1787, did not contain a specific declaration of individual rights. This omission was a source of controversy at the time. Some of the delegates stoutly maintained it was entirely unnecessary to include the bill of Rights in the constitution. Others, notably Thomas Jefferson, insisted that the people were entitled to have a Bill of Rights, as they called it, and have it included right in the Constitution.

Several of the states, in ratifying the Constitution did so with the recommendation that the Bill of Rights be added in the form of amendments. The first congress passed the necessary amendments on September 25, 1789, and they were finally ratified by the states December 15, 1791.

Today is known nationwide as "Bill of Rights Day." It is so designated by an act of congress passed last summer. As our contribution to the observance of the sesquicentennial, we present below the complete text of the BILL of RIGHTS:

Amendment I: Freedom of Religion, Speech and Press, Right of Assembly and Petition
Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Amendment II: Right to Bear Arms
A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Amendment III: Security of the Home Against the Military
No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Amendment IV: Security of the Home Against Search and Seizure
The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Amendment V: Liberty, Property, and Due Process of Law
No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Amendment VI: The Rights of Accused Persons
In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

Amendment VII: Jury Trial in Common Law Suits
In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Amendment VIII: Excessive Bail, Fines, and Punishments
Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Amendment IX: Fundamental Rights of the Individual
The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Amendment X: Reserved Rights of the States
The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

THROUGHOUT this hectic week, we've concentrated on our own affairs, forgetting the WORLD situation. That is natural enough.

But it can't continue. This is a world war. Its strategy is on a world-wide scale. Our fate is bound up with the fate of our allies.

Our fate with Japan is merely one phase of the struggle.

THE eyes of the world are turned today (Friday) on Russia. The Germans are making peace overtures of some sort to the soviet. Soviet words in reply are brave. "Soviet Russia will fight Germany TO THE END and is fully confident the U. S. can defeat the Japanese aggressor." Soviet deeds are creditable for the red army continues today to drive the Germans back.

But no one doubts that Hitler, having tried to destroy Russia and failed, would now like to TEAM UP with Russia. There are few who doubt that he is putting out feelers in that direction.

History teaches us that in world wars anything can be expected.

NAPOLEON fought Russia one day and made friends with her the next. And a little later fought her again—to his doom.

U. S. Seizes French, Swedish Vessels

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—The state department announced today that the United States had taken over the Swedish motor ship Kungsholm, luxury liner which formerly plied the Atlantic and more recently has cruised on Caribbean pleasure trips.

A department statement explained that while the Kungsholm belongs to a friendly power its further use for pleasure cruises is impracticable under the war situation.

Crews were removed yesterday from the big liner Normandie and other French ships in United States ports and it was learned on good authority, the vessels will be operated by the navy.

The Coast Guard, now a part of the navy, seized the \$60,000,000 Normandie at New York, and placed guards aboard her. The state department said the French crews were being taken

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Sentries Shoot 3 Who Fail to Halt

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 (AP)—Sentries shot and killed one man and wounded his companion near the Chicago naval reserve armory early today when the two failed to respond to warning shots and shouted commands to halt their outboard motorboat.

Harry Dudley, 65, of Chicago, died in a hospital from a head wound. His son-in-law, Otto Gehring, 49, of Chicago, was wounded in the arm.

Armory commander W. F. Veatch said the men were shot when they veered their boat close to a coast guard cutter. Subsequent investigation appeared to have been an explanation.

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Rose Bowl and East-West Games Hunt New Fields

Military Expediency Cancels Annual Football Classics at Pasadena and San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 15.—(AP)—The west's famous new year's football classics—the Rose bowl and the East-West games—hunted temporary new homes today as war exigencies loomed.

Military expediency demanded blackout of the games. The army was firm. Sponsors agreed to cooperate fully and cancelled all local arrangements.

Then, as Pasadena and San Francisco kissed dreams of thousands of tourist dollars goodbye, officials went to work to find other quarters for the orphaned sports spectacles.

Where the games might be taken was anybody's guess. Percy Loefer, director of athletics at Oregon State college, the west's Rose bowl representative, said he was "receptive to offers" of a place to hold the game, a feature of the annual Pasadena tournament of roses.

And he got them. Officials of Duke university, Oregon State's choice to represent the east, suggested that the game be played in Duke stadium, at Durham, N. C., "with Rose bowl sanction or otherwise." Chicago, New York and Kansas City were mentioned as other possible sites.

Invitations Not Lacking.

There appeared to be plenty of takers for the east-west game, too. Atlanta, Chicago, Spokane and Norman, Okla., home of the University of Oklahoma, all were reported to have been in touch with east-west representatives. A decision on the east-west encounter, an annual benefit for the Shriner's crippled children's hospital here, was expected today.
