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Japan's Treachery Told by Roosevelt In Defense Address

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told congress today how Japan's course of aggression in the Pacific was climaxed by an attack on the United States at the very time she was voicing a desire for peace, and declared that "there is the record, for all history to read in amazement, in sorrow, in horror and in disgust."

"We are fighting in defense of self defense. We are fighting in defense of our national existence, of our right to be secure, of our right to enjoy the blessings of peace."

"We are fighting in defense of principles of law and order, and justice, against an effort of unprecedented ferocity to overthrow those principles and to impose upon humanity a regime of ruthless domination by unrestricted and arbitrary force."

The chief executive's message was a chronology of American and Japanese negotiations and of history prior to Japan's onslaught in the Pacific eight days ago.

Supporting his summary with documents and correspondence, Mr. Roosevelt asserted that the "barbaric aggression of Japan in Manchuria," ten years ago set the example and pattern for the course of conquest pursued by the axis powers.

"Through the years which followed," he said, "Germany, Italy and Japan reached an understanding to time their acts of aggression to their common advantage—and to bring about the ultimate enslavement of the rest of the world."

Listing the countries which have declared war on Japan, Mr. Roosevelt asserted:

"These and other peace-loving countries will be fighting as we are, first, to put an end to Japan's program of aggression, and, second, to make good the right of nations and mankind to live in peace under conditions of security and justice."

"The people of this country are totally united in their determination to consecrate our national strength and manpower to bring conclusively to an end, the post-clause of aggression and force which has long menaced the world and which now has struck deliberately and directly at the safety of the United States."

Gorthys Write of Raid Experience at Honolulu

Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Gorthy, Roseburg residents now in Honolulu, experienced much excitement during the bombing of Pearl Harbor, according to a letter received here Saturday by Mrs. Gorthy's mother, Mrs. William Gorthy, who resides on Wharton street.

Mr. Gorthy has been employed for the past year in the Pearl Harbor civilian construction and was joined by Mrs. Gorthy and their son, Jack, last summer.

Mrs. Gorthy, in an air mail letter written Dec. 8, the day following the bombing, reported that Jack burned his hand on a piece of hot shrapnel, which he picked up on their front porch. Due to censorship restrictions, Mrs. Gorthy gave no description of the bombing nor of the damage caused.

She reported that much excitement prevailed, but said that she was kept too busy to become badly frightened, as their home was filled by friends who congregated there and she was kept busy preparing meals.

Cast Only "No" Vote on War Against Japan



Only vote in congress yesterday against war on Japan was cast by Miss Jeanette Rankin, above, republican congresswoman from Montana. Her action, followed by a chorus of hisses and boos, kept her pacifist record straight. She voted against the 1917 declaration of war against Germany. The Montana republican state committee yesterday called upon Miss Rankin to "redeem the state's honor" by changing her vote.

Miss Rankin, returned to congress only last year after her retirement a score of years ago, has long since been identified as an ardent pacifist. For years she was the Washington lobbyist for a leading pacifist organization, and is the author of numerous pamphlets and many speeches against armed conflict.
