

## Oakland Show Holds to Ten Year Record

Distinction as World's Largest Display Maintained by 1941 Entry Totals

The 1941 Northwestern Turkey Show, the 13th annual event, which was held last week at Oakland, Oregon, again maintained the 10-year old record of the world's largest exclusive turkey show. With more than 1100 entries in the three divisions, the show was highly successful, despite the handicaps of the war situation.

Attendance on the part of the exhibitors and visitors was somewhat smaller than in recent years, due largely to the blackouts and war uncertainties. The blackouts also interfered to some extent with the entertainment and social functions, particularly, as persons travelling considerable distances in many cases remained away from night functions, due to possibility of being caught in blackouts and being unable to travel by automobile. The show management cancelled the annual Turkey Show ball, but an informal party, presented as a substitute, was so thoroughly enjoyed that in future years such a party may be made a regular feature in addition to the ball.

The banquet, always the highlight of the week's program, was attended by a capacity crowd and was again a memorable feature. The principal address was given by Palmer Hoyt, Portland, publisher of the Oregonian. Rollie Truitt, a native of Oakland, was the toastmaster. The banquet was followed by the distribution of the scores of brilliant and valuable special awards.

The show, held annually during the second week of December, was opened on Tuesday. Judging was started immediately and was quickly discovered to be such a gigantic task, particularly in the utility division, that the show management created a special class, with additional prizes, to ease the pressure on the judges. Quality was so uniform throughout, the judges reported, that it was almost impossible to follow the usual two-class—light and heavy—regulations, and an extra division—medium—was set up.

Despite the aid afforded by this change, and the fact that three instead of two judges were used, the task of selecting the various winners was not completed until a very short time before the hour set for making awards.

The display of dressed birds, an idea originated at Oakland, was made up of 530 of the finest turkeys from Oregon and Washington, aggregating more

than 10,000 pounds in weight. The birds were sold to the Northwestern Turkey Growers association, Salt Lake, and were shipped to San Francisco to be displayed by the association's agency there before being put on the market for the holiday trade.

## Unique Style Show Enjoyed

Exhibit of Turkey Feather Dresses Pleases Crowd At Oakland Event

Promptly at 2:30 o'clock on December 11th the modeling of dresses made with turkey feathers began. In gobblers' hall, the stage was cleared and also a long horseshoe shaped platform was arranged for the contestants. As prize for the winner, much enthusiasm was shown and the hall was crowded with spectators and many "flare" pictures taken. It was, indeed, a splendid feature of the show. Mrs. A. P. Holly, who accompanied her husband, Judge Holley, assisted in the display using several feather creations of her own that were interspersed with the home models. This added much to the beauty of the show, although they could not enter the contest. We most heartily thank Mrs. Holly for her very valuable assistance in making our first style show such a success.

The dresses modeled were: A formal evening gown made of bronze turkey feathers. It was a form fitting princess style with definite circles of "bronze" and white edges. The circles were completed with a frill effect at the bottom of nine rows of long fluff feathers giving the effect of a fur flounce. The neck line was low cut and made entirely of tiny breast feathers with an edging of fluff. The girdle was a brilliant covert, feathers turned and matched to produce a beautiful contrast. This dress was made and modeled by Mrs. Barbara Orr, of Roseburg. It took about 9 weeks to collect the feathers and make the dress. The entire slenderizing effect of the gown was very becoming to Mrs. Orr, and her graceful modeling made it an outstanding creation. It won for her the \$25.00 prize.

The second gown modeled was a street costume worn by Miss Patricia Stearns. It was made of bronze turkey feathers, and consisted of a skirt and sleeveless jacket, with feather accessories of sun parasol and small street hat. Two beautiful drum majorettes' costumes in white turkey feathers were modeled by Miss Barbara Young and Miss Anna Lee Thornton. The one worn by Miss Barbara consisted of a brief flared skirt of white feathers, topped by a red and white blouse and a saucy red cap. She also wore short top white boots. This gown was later modeled by Miss Marie Medley.

The second "Drum Majorette" costume modeled by Miss Anna Lee Thornton was an exact duplicate of the first in style, but with blue and white blouse and cap. Skaters costumes were modeled by Miss Betty Lou Carlson, and Miss Peggy Joe Truitt. These were one-piece dresses with tight fitting waists and brief flared skirts of fine white turkey feathers. White hoods of feathers effectively completed these costumes.

An evening dress of the "gay 90s" was modeled by Mrs. A. P. Holly. It was made of bronze

feathers and consisted of a smooth fitting bodice and hoop skirt. This dress was later modeled by Miss Opal Cole.

The beauty and charm of the young models and the great success of the first regular "Style show" assures us that it can be a leading feature next year—we also hope to have more premiums.

## Observation Posts Not to be Moved Without Permit

Observation posts operated in connection with the air defense warning service are not to be moved from their original locations without prior notification and authorization, Fred Southwick, chairman of the observation post organization, reported today. Mr. Southwick said he had been officially notified that some observers had taken it upon themselves to relocate their posts without being granted authority. As all observation posts are definitely located upon the filter center plotting boards, such changes necessitate changing the boards to conform, re-routing of telephone channels and numerous other details, Mr. Southwick said he is advised. As the department at present is too busy engaged in other important activities, it is impossible to make changes in observation post locations at present. Observers therefore are notified that posts must be maintained in their original locations until official authorization for change can be obtained.

**More Recruits Needed**  
Mr. Southwick reports that additional recruits are needed for a number of the observation posts throughout the county. The posts are being manned 24 hours daily, and in some cases persons are giving as much as 10 or 12 hours each day. Each station should have at least 16 observers, he states, and he is urging the chief observers to immediately recruit their crews to full strength. Volunteers particularly are needed at Landers' lookout, Reston lookout, Cochran lookout on Red Hill, and the Myrtle Creek station, one-half mile east of Myrtle Creek. Residents in those districts willing to assist in manning the stations are asked to contact the chief observers in their localities immediately.

## Spain's Action Points To Plunge Into War

MADRID, Dec. 15.—(AP)—The Spanish Transatlantic company announced today that all sailings of Spanish merchantmen for the Americas had been postponed "by government order."

Specifically the company said the scheduled sailing of the liner Marques de Comillas for New York tomorrow had been postponed.

(The dispatch did not explain the significance of this development, but cancellation of ship sailings has been a signal of an approaching change of a country's status with respect to the war—as in the case of Italy in the late spring of 1940.

(Spain signed the anticommunist pact last month and there have been rumors of German efforts to enlist her more closely in the axis cause, perhaps to get her to permit the passage of axis troops to northwestern Africa.

## Five "Don'ts" For Civilians Listed

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 15.—(AP)—"This is a modern war," the navy warned today. "The enemy will utilize every conceivable means to obtain information."

Addressing a caution to civilians, the navy imposed five "don'ts":

1. Don't discuss movements or concentrations of our navy or merchant ships.
  2. Don't discuss new military techniques or new weapons.
  3. Don't discuss defense plant production capacities.
  4. Don't discuss movements or concentrations of naval personnel or marines.
  5. Don't discuss naval shore construction project.
- Enemy spies, the navy warned, "will be listening for the stray spoken word, watching avidly for the chance clue in the printed story," and in either of these—in one innocently sounding phrase, there may be "enough information to sink a troop-packed transport, or blast a shipyard."
