Oregon Daylight Saving Opposed by Sprague

SALEM, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Governor Charles A. Sprague said today he did not favor adoption of daylight saving time in Oregon. He has been proposed in California by Governor Culbert L. Olson.

Governor Sprague said he told Olson in a telephone conversation that Oregon, being largely rural, is opposed to daylight saving time. "Daylight saving time," Govern-

or Sprague said, "would be particularly bad during the winter months. We would have sunrise now around 8:30 a. m., instead of at 7:30 a. m., and that would be a distinct disadvantage, especially during blackouts."
