Weather Data Now On Limited Basis

The U. S. weather bureau today resumed issuance of weather statistics on a somewhat restricted basis. The bureau has been prevented from giving out information on weather conditions, since the declaration of war, while plans were being worked out to provide needed information for purely local purposes without providing data which might prove useful to the enemy.

The weather statistics, publication of which is resumed in the News-Review today, will include maximum and minimum temperatures, rainfall measurements, etc. The weather bureau, however, will not be permitted to issue forecasts except in extreme emergencies. Warnings can be given of impending cold waves and daytime storm warnings can be issued, both for publication and radio broadcast, but information on cloud conditions, wind directions and long range forecasts are strictly taboo.

Ban Put on Information About Draft Quotas

The Douglas county selective service board today received instructions from national headquarters to withhold in the future any information concerning the quotas of men to be inducted into the army, date of inductions, etc. Heretofore information has been given in advance of the induction dates.

During the past few days the work of the board has been so greatly increased that it has been necessary to employ two additional clerks. Because of this great increase in work, it is stated, it is necessary that the board adhere strictly to the regulation providing that registrants desiring to make an appearance before the board first secure a definite appointment. An appointment can be arranged by contacting the chief clerk, R. L. Preston, chairman, stated.

Jap Peddler Revealed Imperial Army Major

MANILA, Dec. 19.—(AP)—An "excuse, please" murmuring little Japanese shopkeeper named Hara, who for the past few years sold loaves of bread and soda pop to residents of Vigan, was unmasked today as Major Hara of the Imperial Japanese army.

A Filipino arriving from a town near Japanese-occupied Vigan, 200 miles northwest of Manila, told the story. He said Hara was arrested at the outbreak of hostilities but when the first Japanese troops landed on Dec. 10 they proceeded directly to the jail and released him.

He then donned his major's uniform. Hara is also Japanese "military governor of the province of Ilocos Sur."
