American Legion Auxiliary Activities

"Peace on earth, Good will to men," that legend which has been heralded to a joyous nation in years gone by, is America's call to oppressed ones today. The words have a double meaning today. America is coming! Christmas must not be a travesty! Observe it. The auxiliary sent its Christmas greetings over the air waves this week when the Methodist church choir sang Christmas carols during the regular auxiliary program. To all of you everywhere we say "Peace in your hearts and in your homes this Christmas season." To the veterans disabled and in hospitals, rest. You did your part. Someday we will understand. May Christmas for you this 1941 be a bit brighter because the Legion auxiliary remembered.

"To the people" the bill of rights was addressed," said F. L. Crittendon, speaking to a large crowd of Legionnaires and auxiliary members this week. There lies the difference between Americans and the peoples under Hitler, Mussolini and Japan, "Critt explained we, the people here would lay our last dime and our last drop of blood for those rights of the people," he said. Mr. Crittendon paid tribute to the ability of Harry Pinniger in carrying to such a degree of completion the civilian defense program of Roseburg and the county. He is a live wire, said Mr. Crittendon, and we are proud of him.

Lieut. J. T. Runyan explained the work of the filter center and jokingly remarked that he believed he had been responsible for more sleepless nights on the part of the women than any other person in town lately. Lieut. Runyan and Mr. Pinniger urged that everyone who has signed up for filter center work, keep their appointments. The "Japs" said Lieut. Runyan, do not take time out.

District Commander Victor Micelli cautioned that we be careful of criticism. During the last war persons suffered because of the way they spelled their names. Why, on the alert the other night, he said, Pinniger answered the first call to Portland and when Micelli answered the second, I heard a gasp at the other end. Notify your officers if you are suspicious. There must be no vigilante groups, he stated.

Commander Harry Chenoweth of Sutherlin said they were all ready to go up there. "All we need is the whistle," he said. Ellen Post, executive secretary

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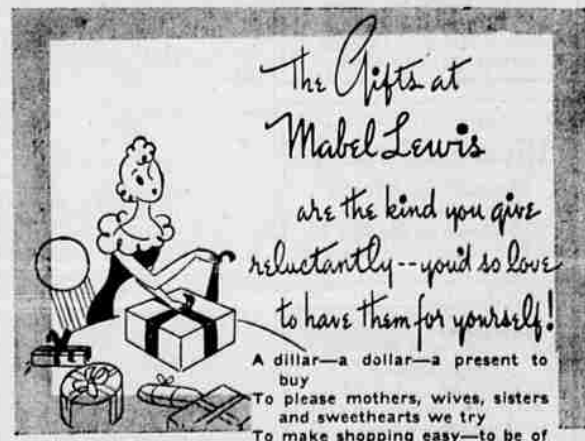


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
