

Pearl Harbor Raid Brought National Unity, Cordon Says

Roseburg Attorney Tells of Reaction in Washington to Japanese Treachery

The national capital presented a most interesting and inspiring spectacle Dec. 7, the day of the Japanese attack on Pearl harbor, according to Attorney Guy Cordon, who returned to his home in Roseburg Sunday after spending the past two months in Washington, D. C. Mr. Cordon was present during the war excitement, and reports that it was most interesting and gratifying to see all political differences disappear in a flash and a spirit of solidarity and national unity spring into almost instant existence.

As news came of the attack on Pearl harbor, huge crowds gathered in the park across the street from the White house, to watch the cabinet officers, department heads and military leaders hurrying in and out of conferences. The capital took on a military appearance within comparatively few minutes, as guards from armed services quickly were thrown around governmental bureaus and departments. While there was a considerable amount of confusion evident during the first few hours, the capital quickly settled into a steady and organized hum of activity, Cordon said.

Mr. Cordon, who is legal counsel for the Association of Oregon Counties, went to Washington to work on an amendment to the O. and C. land grant act. The amendment would specifically include within the scope of the act about a half million acres of land which the railroad company owned but upon which patents had not been issued at the time the grant was revested in the federal government. There previously had been a question whether the lands rightfully belonged in the O. and C. grant or in the national forest. The amendment has been submitted and is now before the departments involved and the bureau of the budget. Final action will await the reports from these departments.

Supplies Dropped to Marooned Party of 3

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Supplies have been dropped to pilot Archie Ferguson and his two passengers who have been marooned on a small ice-covered lake between Kotzebue sound and Fairbanks since Thursday and efforts will be made today to land a small plane on the

ice to bring the trio in. Ferguson, flying with Dr. David Hoehn, Fairbanks, and Norman Anthony, Kotzebue, made a forced landing on the frozen lake while en route here when ice formed on the wings of his plane. He managed to radio a report of his situation before his transmitter went dead and search planes proceeded to search for him immediately, locating him Saturday. The lake is too small for the large search planes to land upon.

Rilea Takes Oath as Oregon's Adj. General

SALEM, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. Thomas Rilea was sworn in as Oregon's adjutant general today and Governor Sprague immediately granted him a leave of absence to permit him to retain command of the 41st division's 82d brigade at Fort Lewis.

Rilea succeeds the late Maj. Gen. George A. White, the governor having announced two weeks ago that he would appoint Rilea. Lt. Col. Wilmer V. Wooten, acting adjutant general since the Oregon national guard was inducted into federal service in September, 1940, will remain in his present job until Rilea returns from active duty, presumably after the end of the war.

Millworking Industry Hit By Federal Fines

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Forty-eight firms and individuals, convicted last week on charges of violation of the Sherman anti-trust act, were fined a total of \$144,000 Saturday by Federal Judge St. Sure as a climax to the government's "trust busting" case involving the mill working industry in the bay area. Twenty-three of the defendants were found guilty by a jury last week and the other 25 previously had pleaded nolo contendere.

Defense Courses for Police Slated in Oregon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The justice department listed today eleven Pacific coast cities where FBI civilian defense courses for police will be given next January 5 to 10 to instruct local authorities in blackout enforcement, conveying, evacuation of civilians and other war time problems. The cities: San Luis Obispo, Eureka and Santa Rosa, Calif.; Eugene, Medford and Pendleton, Ore.; Aberdeen, Bellingham, Okanogan, Walla Walla and Wenatchee, Wash.
