SALEM, Dec. 23—(AP)—Western civilian defense headquarters in San Francisco today asked Jerrold Owen, state civilian defense coordinator, to cancel tonight's show in the Multnomah civic stadium in Portland when the army and state civilian defense officers will show the public how to handle incendiary and demolition bombs, as well as give them other air raid instructions.
