Letter Tells Of War-time Life in British Village

A letter giving an insight on how the English people are living under bombing and wartime restrictions was received in Roseburg today by Mrs. M. E. Ritter, from her friend, Mrs. Elizabeth Ashby, who is well-known in Roseburg.

Mailed November 18, Mrs. Ashby extended Christmas greetings to her friends in Roseburg, and said "there will be very little in the way of gifts here. Even if one had the money to spend, there is not much one would care to buy except books."

Mrs. Ashby said the full allowance of clothes coupons is very small, and "I think by the end of the war most men will be very shabby, and I don't think the women will be very smart." But, she adds, "we grumble at times about some of the restrictions, but on the whole we think things are well regulated."

"I think now, instead of grumbling at the small food rations, we are learning to be thankful when the minister of food allows us anything extra." Each person receives 1 pound of sugar each week, 2 ounces of butter, 3 ounces of lard, and 3 ounces of cheese. Mrs. Ashby said, and milk and eggs are almost unobtainable. Pears are 30 cents each, and apples 25c a pound, she stated.

Her village has had "a marvellously quiet time for several months, Mrs. Ashby reveals, "but fire bombs have been dropped even in our quiet village."
