VARIETY OF NEW BOOKS NOW AVAILABLE AT ROSEBURG LIBRARY

New books available to readers at the Roseburg public library include the following:

About the war:
"Where Stands a Winged Sentry" by Margaret Kennedy, tells about life in England during war times. All around her she sees the war level class distinction and stir far-reaching social change.

"Nine Lives," by Alice Grant Rossman. This is a biography of a cat in London in peace and war. Samuel Penguin is a cat of character and this is the story of the London he came to know and the war he was to experience.

"London Pride," by Phyllis Bottomo is a story about a family who live in the dock yards tenements of London. The first raid, nights in a shelter, the abandoned house that was struck while the children were playing in it, the hospital and the forced evacuation are matters they face. It is a book you will remember.

"Joy Homer's Dawn Watch in China," is a story of adventure in battle and a heart-warming portrayal of people—exciting, comic, agonized, jubilant. Speaking Chinese, she interviewed China's leaders the country over. She returned finally, an authority on China's war.

American scene:
"Two Ends to Our Shrestring" by Mrs. Kathrene S. Pinkerton begins with her marriage to a wandering journalist, recalls his illness which made retirement to the north woods necessary, their writing which earned a living, experiences along the way while traveling in a foot-loose manner, the development of their daughter Bobs, and the making of a happy marriage. Fills in gaps between her "Wilderness Wife" and "Three's a Crew."

"Big Family" by Bellamy Partidge. A chronicle of the robust family life of the author's parents and their eight children. It has neither nostalgia nor sentimentality, but only a humorous appreciation of well-meant discipline and the hilarity of evading it, and of a leisurely, abundant way of living.

"American Glass" by George S. and Helen McKearin is a very complete book on the subject. There are more than 3000 illustrations and is a work of authority.

"Setting Your Table, Its Art, Etiquette and Service," by Helen Sprackling. A partial list of the contents includes: The art of good dining and setting the scene for it. Your china, glassware, linen and present day manners of eating.

"Sowing for the Home," by Mary Brooks Picken. This book assumes only that you are interested in making your home attractive. It is planned for use on any scale you choose. All direc-

tions are given in an explicit step-by-step method, and each difficult point is explained with drawings.

"Colorado Conquest" by David Oakes Woodbury is the dramatic story of the taming of the Colorado by means of Boulder dam, and the development of Imperial valley. It is adorned with fictional characters. It succeeds in presenting graphically the carrying out of a vast project.

Fiction:
"Timeless Land" by Eleanor Dark. A colony established on Botany Bay in 1788, with ship loads of convicts and soldiers; illness, mutiny, poor food and barren land, and troubles with natives demoralized by contact with white men made survival doubtful. This is a story of the first English settlement in Australia.

"Angels Fell" by Anne Miller Downes is a story of Irene Blyth determined to make her aristocratic young husband a "success." He did leave the Greenwich Village bookshop; he did enter the brokerage business and they were able to move into that big house in Westchester; but the price kept going higher and higher. Almost to the end, Stephen Blyth loved his wife too much to understand that her ambition was more than youthful restlessness.

"Wakefield's Course" by Mazo DeLa Roche is another, "Jalna" story. The experiences of the two artistic members of the family—Wakefield, the actor, and Finch, the musician, Jalna, London, Ireland, and finally Dunkirk furnish the background.

"Now, Voyager" by Mrs. Olive Prouty. A pleasing light novel that will appeal to many readers. Charlotte Vale of Boston, while dominated by her rich mother, lives an unhappy, hampered life. In her thirties she falls in love while on a cruise, and her awakening changes her whole life.
