Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, Dr. Charles A. Edwards officiating. Concluding services and interment will be at the Civil Bend cemetery.

Aliens Warned to Turn In Guns, Cameras, Radios

Sheriff Cliff Thornton announced today that all Japanese, German and Italian aliens who possess firearms, ammunition, explosive material, cameras or short wave radio transmitters or receivers must turn such articles in to any law-enforcement officer by 11 p. m. tonight, or be subject to arrest.

Under a presidential proclamation, a short wave receiver is defined as one capable of receiving frequencies over 1750 kilocycles, or under 540 kilocycles. Heavy studio cameras need not be turned in, but all portable cameras must be deposited with city, county, or state officers.

Cameras and radio equipment will not be confiscated, but receipts will be issued for each article turned in. Sheriff Thornton said. If an alien is not sure his radio receiver falls in the short-wave classification, he should have an officer examine it, the sheriff stated.

Changsha Again Goal of Renewed Jap Offensive

CHUNGKING, Dec. 29.—(AP)—The main spearhead of a broad central China Japanese offensive was reported in Chinese front dispatches today to have pierced to within forty miles north of Changsha, capital of Hunan province and now for the third time the objective of a major Japanese drive.

Civilians were fleeing the city as the Japanese, reinforced by several thousand fresh troops, drew near, after forcing a crossing of the Milo river under a heavy artillery barrage, the dispatches said.

It was not known whether a small American community, composed mostly of missionaries, had withdrawn. Valuable American property in Changsha includes the Yale-in-China university, a hospital and a medical school.

The Japanese first tried to seize Changsha in 1939 but were beaten back short of their goal. Last summer they captured and held it for three days before withdrawing to bases further north, declaring the purposes of their thrust had been achieved.

A Chinese communique issued here, however, indicated the Chinese were holding the broad Japanese offensive on most of the sectors, which stretch across parts of four provinces.

Ex-Glendale Postmaster Dies in Corvallis

GLENDALE, Dec. 29.—Word was received here today of the death of Lucius L. Hurd, of Portland, in the general hospital in Corvallis Saturday, December 27, after a short illness. Mr. Hurd was a long resident here and was postmaster here for 32 years. The past two and a half years he had made his home in Portland, and had gone to spend the holidays with his son, Lucius, in Corvallis when death occurred.

Mr. Hurd was born March 22, 1860, and is survived by his wife, Sarah, one son, Lucius, and two grandchildren, one brother, in Tacoma, Wash., and one sister, in Rochester, Minn.

The funeral services will be held in Hannassy's funeral home in Portland, Tuesday, December 30.

Churchill in Ottawa; Broadcasts Tomorrow

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 29.—(AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill reached Ottawa from Washington today to receive an enthusiastic welcome from Canadians on his history-making visit to North America.

He is to give an important address to the Canadian people tomorrow.

Broadcast of Churchill's address to the Canadian parliament is being arranged for Tuesday afternoon by the MBS network. The time is announced as 10:45 a. m. PST, or shortly thereafter.
