Price Increase Allowed On Douglas Fir Doors

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29—(AP)—The office of price administration today granted manufacturers of Douglas fir doors permission to increase their charges to buyers who were not entitled to the usual trade discounts in the first nine months of 1941, before a price ceiling was imposed.

An amendment permits manufacturers to give such small buyers a discount two points below the list price. The amendment also increases the price premium on raised panel house doors (types F-5 and F-117) from 10 to 25 cents.

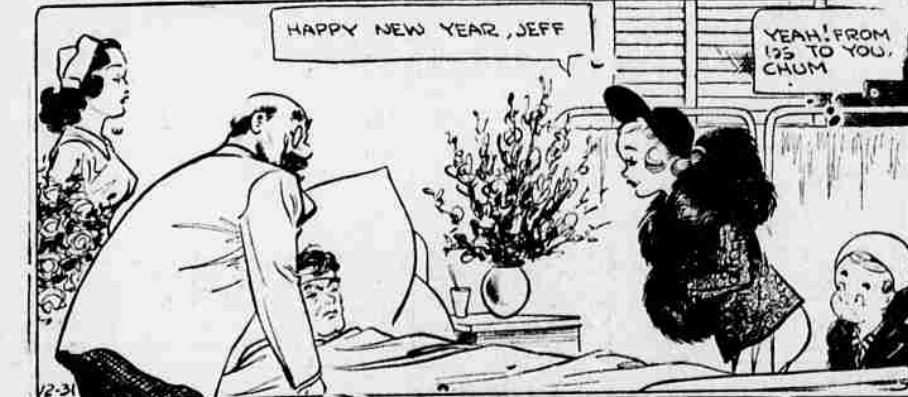
