Sailors Accuse Bosses Of Double-Dealing

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 31.—(AP)—The Sailors' Union of the Pacific telegraphed the U. S. maritime commission last night and charged shipowners with "waving the flag with one hand and with the other attempting to chisel seamen out of their just rights."

The telegram addressed to Admiral Emory S. Land, maritime commission chairman, was signed by Harry Lundberg, union secretary-treasurer.

"Many seamen," Lundberg wired Land, "already have lost their lives and others have been left destitute on the beach without even getting compensation for lost clothes."
