

Rival Coaches Of Rose Bowl Teams Confident Of Win

Bookies Favor Duke to Beat OSC by 2 Touchdowns; Each School to Net \$75,000

DURHAM, N. C., Dec. 31.—(AP)—The Rose bowl practice ground is gone with 1941. Now riding with the New Year's fates are the hopes of a middle-aged coach climbing toward the top, and of a battle-scarred veteran fighting to stay up there.

For Lon Stiner, who is only 38 years old, the Rose bowl game will be an opportunity of a lifetime. He is one of the youngest coaches ever to produce a Rose bowl team, and if his underdog Oregon State squad should beat the undefeated and untied Ducks, Lon would emerge as one of the nation's greatest football technicians.

The game tomorrow will be an old story for Wallace Wade of Duke. The 49-year-old mentor has coached four other Rose bowl teams, and he also played in the bowl when he was a guard at Brown in 1916. Bookies here think his 1941 Ducks will win by two touchdowns.

Both clubs are in good condition. Both coaches are confident. There will be no alibis.

Every hotel and most of the boarding houses in this city that tobacco built have been overflowing for several days, but still the crowds continue to pour in.

Wooden bleachers have blossomed like petals from the fringes of the transplanted Rose bowl, which in reality is Duke stadium. All seats have been sold for weeks, and approximately 55,000 persons will see the classic.

Scalpers already are asking \$15 apiece for tickets.

After Uncle Sam and the state of North Carolina get their cuts, Duke and Oregon State will divide a \$200,000 melon. Part of this, of course, will go for expenses but each school should net about \$75,000.

It's been estimated unofficially that 75,000 additional tickets could have been sold if there had been any way of getting the customers into the stadium. That should give you an idea of how football-whacky this section has become. It also may give someone an idea to try promoting an annual New Year's day bowl game in these parts.

RHS Basketeers To Play Junction In Season's Debut

Roseburg high school's Indian basketball team makes their first full-distance start of the new hoop season when they tangle with Junction City on the home floor Saturday night at 7:30.

The Junction City team is reported to be strong, sporting a veteran aggregation that has won several games this year. Saturday night's game will be the last of a three-game barnstorming tour for them.

The Indians started practice Monday after a week's lay-off for the holidays. Two workouts were held Tuesday. The team looked impressive, but badly out of condition, according to Coach Jim Davis.

Tuesday afternoon's session was devoted to fundamentals, and was topped off with a 20-minute scrimmage. The evening practice was given over to a new defensive formation, which, from all indications, will prove effective.

Positions for the starting Indian five are still wide open. Davis says those showing best at this time are Ward Cummings, John Ness, Melvin Baker and Harold Cacy, guards; Ed Hughes, Lee Wimberly, Art Stephens and Merlin Anderson, forwards; and George James, center.

James has all the qualifications of a great basketball player, according to Davis. He shoots well and learns fast, and needs only to improve his defensive play.

Ed Hughes, the only letterman, holdover, is recovering rapidly from an ankle sprain received at the jamboree. Hughes shows possibilities of being one of the best drivers in the conference, from his play at the jamboree.

Local fans should get an opportunity Saturday night to see if the Indians can repeat last year's win of the conference flag, and a trip to the state tournament.

Women Unit For U. S. Army Plan Before Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—Women volunteers in khaki uniforms would be enrolled as privates and officers of the United States Army under a plan approved today by the war department and now awaiting congressional action.

A uniformed women's auxiliary corps to serve directly with the army in the aircraft warning service and in clerical and other noncombatant posts was recommended by Secretary of War Stimson in a letter to the house military affairs committee. His letter endorsed a bill by rep. Edith Nourse Rogers (R-Mass.), calling for establishment of the feminine corps.

Stimson said the size of the women's army would depend upon military requirements and estimated its cost during 1942 at \$3,000,000.

Modeled in general on the auxiliary territorial service in which thousands of British women are enrolled, the American counterpart would pay privates \$21 a month, the same as army men. Women officers and non-commissioned officers would be chosen on merit, trained in special schools and granted pay in line with army pay for similar posts.

Units of the women's corps would be stationed at each large army post or camp. They would live in barracks and be subject to military discipline.

Outside of several drill hours weekly they would do clerical and secretarial jobs and work as teleprinter operators, cooks, bakers, dieticians, pharmacists, telephone operators and hospital and laboratory technicians.

Stimson indicated that the women's corps would take over entirely the present aircraft warning system operated by civilian volunteers. In Britain the A. T. S. also operates fire control apparatus of anti-aircraft batteries, working with gunners under fire.

SALEM, Dec. 30.—(AP)—State department offices in Portland and Salem will be open until 8 p. m. tonight and tomorrow night for convenience of persons wanting to buy 1942 automobile license plates, which must be purchased before Thursday, Secretary of State Snell said today.

A total of 143,531 pairs of plates have been distributed, a gain of 18,278 over the same period a year ago, but more than 300,000 persons still have not bought their new plates.

Keep Hats On At Outdoor Rites To Ban Colds, Advice

"Let public men keep their hats on outdoors at ceremonial occasions during bad weather," warns Dr. Leonard Keene Hirschberg, director of the Institute for Scientific Research of the Hospital Age publications, in a satirical drawing attention to the many prominent men who have died because of colds caught while standing outdoors bareheaded at various ceremonial functions.

"It is particularly urgent at this time that our executives keep themselves fit for constant service and avoid risks to health," Dr. Hirschberg said. "One of the most certain ways to catch cold and develop serious illness is to go outdoors bareheaded."

"George Washington, Ambassador Herrick, Admiral Beatty, England's sea hero of the last war, and King George V are among the many famous men whose deaths were directly traceable to one ultimate cause—a common cold caught while standing bareheaded outdoors during a ceremonial occasion."

The doctor suggests that some salute which would not necessitate hatlessness, be devised for such occasions.
