U. S. to Buy Cuba's Sugar To Assure Home Supply

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(AP)—The government took concrete steps today to protect American consumers against any possible sugar shortage and skyrocketing prices by arranging to buy the bulk of the 1942 Cuban sugar cane crop.

The transaction was announced at a time when war in the Pacific clouded prospects of getting further supplies from the Philippine Islands, normally a source of about 14 per cent of United States sugar requirements.

Government authorities said the deal would make available to the United States upwards of half its annual needs. A part of the Cuban crop, however, may be turned over to Great Britain and Russia under the lend-lease program.

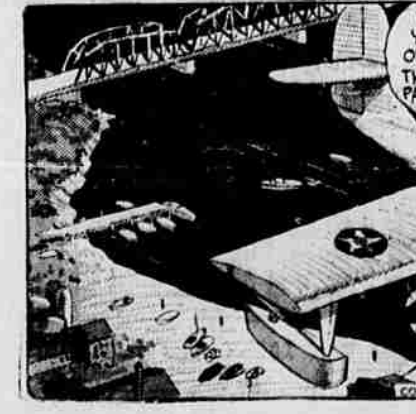
