SALEM, Dec. 31.—(AP)—The state tax commission said today it would set up machinery for collection of the state two-cent per package cigarette tax unless suit is filed against the commission to restrain it from collecting the tax.

The Oregon Retail Grocers association was expected to go into supreme court to obtain an order forcing a referendum on the law.

The commission also announced that it would send out 200,000 income tax returns this week.
