A YEAR ago today Hitler, in a New Year's message to his troops, said:

"The year 1941 will BRING COMPLETION of the greatest victory in our history."

Today, speaking again to his soldiers in a New Year's order of the day, he says:

1941 HAS BEEN a year of heaviest decisions and most sanguinary fighting but WILL BE known in history as the year of our greatest victories of all times."

He adds that Russian power must be definitely smashed.

WHILE Hitler was thus addressing his people and his soldiers, the Kubyshchev (Russian) radio was broadcasting:

"In 1942, we shall chase every

German out of Russia and score a final victory."

Remember that it will be DEEDS, not words, that will lick Hitler.

Use of Surgical Tape on Windows Inadvisable Now

Don't use that adhesive tape in the medical chest to tape the front window as an air-raid precaution. It is unpatriotic—there is not enough adhesive tape in the country to do the job, and a shortage may develop.

Joseph K. Carson, Jr., inspector general for the office of civilian defense, made this demand today following an appeal from the health supplies branch of the Division of purchases of OPM. Carson recommends the use of ordinary gummed industrial, or scotch tape.

"It is not only wasteful but unpatriotic to tape windows with a highly refined product containing critical materials when the same purpose is served by a less vital material," said William M. Bristol Jr., head of the division of purchases, OPM.

"The surgical adhesive tape contains three materials needed for defense—rubber, zinc, and cloth. It seems hardly necessary to point out that in the event of a bombing such tape might be needed for surgical dressings, and it would be unfortunate if the supply in some bombed locality had been exhausted through purchases of surgical tape for use on windows."

Mr. Bristol asked druggists to co-operate in the conservation of the surgical tape. "I am certain that no one would buy this surgical tape for use on windows if he knew the facts. The druggist can help out by explaining the situation and recommending another material that will be equally effective."

SUGGESTS BIBLE READING IN RAID REFUGE CELLAR

TILLER, Ore., Jan. 2.—Editor News-Review: The instructions given by Mr. LaGuardia as to what to do in case of an air raid and printed in the News-Review Dec. 17 are very good indeed, and seem to be well planned considering the short time we have been at war.

Advice of Lindbergh Acceptable, Stimson Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Secretary Stimson said yesterday the war department was ready to accept from Charles A. Lindbergh "or anyone else" any advice which might help in the war effort.

Stimson made the comment after stating no action had been taken on the flier's request for active army service. Lindbergh resigned as a colonel in the air reserves last summer while engaged in making speeches opposing the foreign policies of the president.

TACOMA, Jan. 2.—(AP)—An Indian was arrested today after his wife was found dead in their home near Fife late last night. Highway Aid Limited To Military Defense

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—The federal works agency yesterday apportioned \$137,500,000 among states and territories for highway construction and improvements in 1942.

Oregon was allotted \$1,649,132 regular aid; \$288,508 secondary and \$228,533 crossings.

U. S. Outlays For War Prosecution Set New Records

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The treasury reported today it spent in December, the first month of the war, more than in any other month in United States history.

December expenditures aggregated \$2,557,434,474, including \$1,049,555,911 for direct defense activities. This exceeded by a half-billion dollars the peak spending of the world war, which was \$2,061,000,000 in December, 1918, the month after the armistice.

The December figures were announced as the new war budget, calling for the greatest spending effort in world annals, went to the printers.

The total of direct defense costs in December reflected the sharp step-up since the beginning of the defense program early in 1940. The December total exceeded November defense spending by \$400,000,000 and was more than three times the size of defense spending last January.

Other Records Set.

Also, the treasury statement of its finances on December showed results of the first half of the current fiscal year. In those six months, the treasury spent \$11,552,859,863 including \$8,214,186,367 for defense, took in revenues of \$4,165,910,978 and had a deficit of \$7,386,948,885. These were all records for a six months period.

The war brought still another record, with the sale of \$536,285,664 of defense savings bonds in December. This was more than double monthly sales figures of other recent months, and eclipsed the monthly record of \$349,818,000 last May when the defense savings program began.

Contents of the budget were still secret and guarded to prevent premature disclosure before presentation to congress some day next week.

But the president already has hinted publicly at war costs of \$50,000,000,000 for the next fiscal year (the 12 months beginning July 1, 1942), indicating a total federal budget of roughly \$55,000,000,000 after allowing for non-military activities.

May Move Industries.

President Roosevelt disclosed today that the question of moving airplane and other war industries from vulnerable seacoast points to the interior was receiving new consideration.

He told reporters that America must learn by experience and understand that sometimes it is impossible to take a whole plant and move it from one locality to another.

Certain divisions of a factory, however, he said, might be moved back from the seacoasts at a moment's notice. He suggested, too, that perhaps production facilities would be split, with one unit in one spot and perhaps an assembly line in another, so that an entire plant would not be destroyed in a single raid.

In some instances, he said, there might be a duplication of facilities to prevent an interruption of production by bombing.
