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Chinese, Japs In Bloody Battle For City of Changsha

CHUNGKING, China, Jan. 2.—Japanese occupation of the northern suburbs of Changsha, Hunan province capital and silk center, was acknowledged by the Chinese today as fighting in a shifting, no-quester battle for possession of the city raged without a pause.

Casualties on both sides were said to be enormous. The Chinese also were engaged in bloody hand-to-hand fighting in the next eastward province of Kiangsi and were reported directly attacking the wine-making city of Shaohing in the coastal province of Chekiang roughly 500 miles northeast of the Changsha battle zone.

The Japanese have suffered two of their worst defeats of the Chinese war in vain attempts to capture and hold Changsha, once in October, 1939, and again last September.

This time, Chinese sources declared, the Japanese have poured reinforcements across the Luyang river to build their strength up to 100,000 men. Some foreign observers discounted this figure as probably too large.

"A battle of annihilation is being unfolded as the Chinese carry out an encircling movement against the main Japanese forces," the Chinese central news agency reported.

Milady May Lose Figure Because of Needs of Defense

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Maybe pop will have to sacrifice his automobile tires to beat the axis, but what about Miss America, who may lose her figure?

Wait 'til she realizes what the war is going to mean in terms of foundation garments. Not to mention garters. And bathing suits. And countless other feminine items in which elasticity holds the secret of success.

While the rubber shortage first may have father sitting up nights with a shotgun before the year is over to guard his tires from itching fingers of desperate neighbors, the distaff side of the family will be facing a major morale problem a little later—control of girth without a girdle.

Production of all but essential civilian rubber goods was halted by the government last month, after the outbreak of war in the Pacific shut off Far Eastern sources of crude rubber supplies. Inventories at that time were very large, but toward the end of 1942 or early in 1943 present stocks of corsets, girdles, golf balls, sink stoppers, and thousands of other gadgets and near-essentials common in all households or offices will be exhausted.

OPM experts predict the real pinch in the rubber shortage will

be felt in 1943 and 1944, leaving seeming hardships of tire rationing almost pale in comparison.

And, barring restoration of Far Eastern trade, they express little hope of getting domestic and South American rubber production into high gear until 1947. By that time, father will have put away the shotgun and left the car in storage, and mother's figure probably will be a censored subject of conversation.

Many of the immediate civilian problems could be solved, the experts say, if rubber could be reclaimed indefinitely. However, it eventually loses its elasticity under the reclaiming process—and milady's girdles made of reclaimed rubber would promptly, obviously, and unfortunately lose their two-way stretch.
