NEW BOOKS NOW AVAILABLE AT ROSEBURG LIBRARY

New books now available at the Roseburg public library include:

Non-Fiction: ANYBODY'S GOLD by Joseph Henry Jackson. Most of the forty-niners didn't get rich. Instead, they got fevers, rheumatism, dyspepsia, and general aches and pains. The average miner wasn't a grizzled old pard as we have been led to believe, but an adventurous young man of 24 who had joined the gold rush because he was tired of his job back east or perhaps he had none. And most of them—those who didn't die of their sicknesses, and who didn't get killed for a few dollars in dust—went home sadder and wiser or settled in the cities and went into real estate, miners' supplies or groceries. There is plenty of color and drama in this side of the gold rush. Joseph Henry Jackson tells it in vivid detail.

YOUNG NORTHWEST by Richard G. Montgomery. Here at long last, is the dramatic and sweeping story of the Pacific Northwest. On these pages, you will learn something of its unique geology, of its Indians, of early explorations by land and sea, of Captain Robert Gray, of Lewis and Clark, of Dr. John McLoughlin, of the struggle between the Yankees and the British, of the missionaries, of the covered wagons, of the growth of cities, of the gradual building of an Empire, of Bonneville and of Grand Coulee.

CENTRAL AMERICA by Charles Morrow Wilson. It is an exciting book for anyone interested in Latin America and our relations to it. The spectacle and color of the landscape and the people are here, but this is much more than a travel book; enough of the history, politics and commerce for a real understanding of each nation, and there is particular attention to agriculture. Superb photographs enhance the beauty and variety of the scene Mr. Wilson describes.

THE BOOK OF OLD SILVER by Seymour B. Wyler. A history and guide to Old Silver and Old Sheffield Plate, with the most comprehensive tables of hallmarks ever published in one book. The splendid pictures are from photographs of authentic pieces from the foremost dealers in antique silver.

SINUS by Russell Clark Grove supplies as much information to the sinus sufferer as is possible without individual diagnosis. Written in non-technical language, this book is completely up to date and is completely authoritative.

WEEDS ARE MORE FUN by Priscilla Hovey Wright. Under Mrs. Wright's satirical microscope, the great American movement (Gag'm for short) shows up with pitiless clarity. In this witty dissection of all that gardeners hold dear, you will recognize your next door neighbor and even yourself—planting, weeding, watering and cherishing your pet plant project.

ANOTHER ENGLAND by Dillys Bennett Laing. A new poet who faces the realities of our world with courage and wit, and the range of her work is remarkably wide—from the strong statement and burning force of the title poem to fresh and sparkling lyrics, from challenging poems of these times to timeless images of a New England she has learned to know and love.

JOURNEY FOR MARGARET by William Lindsay White. A journalist went to England to report what he saw of the war in London, and incidentally to adopt a British child. The child he found was three and one-half year old Margaret, suffering from fear of bombings and losses of parents and foster parents. His moving story is of experiences fighting night fires and rescuing the wounded, as well as of little Margaret's reactions and gradual return to normalcy.

Fiction: THE VENABLE by Kathleen Norris. There were five other children in the Venable family, but it is Flo upon whom interest centers as she accepts responsibility and develops into maturity after the father's death leaves them poverty-stricken. It is a warm-hearted family chronicle laid in San Francisco before and after the earthquake.

SILVER SPOON by Clarence Buddington Kelland. The story

of a rich, useless young man who makes good on his own after a wager, and finds that he prefers the pretty young red-headed dancer and his new friends to his former more fashionable companions. Popular, rather obvious, diversion, which reads easily and includes suitable amounts of excitement, sentimentality, and patriotism.

LONG WINTER ENDS by Newton G. Thomas. Here is a heart-warming and inspiring story of a man's courageous search for security in a strange new land. Forced to migrate from his native Cornwall, Jim Holman secures work in the copper mines of upper Michigan. Through the homesickness of that first arduous winter, he finds growing within himself a new faith in his ability to create a future in this world where miners can become teachers, engineers, or musicians if they will. A well written novel of social history and human aspiration.

WHAT MAKES SAMMY RUN by Budd Wilson Schulberg. Everyone of us knows someone who runs. He is one of the symptoms of our times—from the little man who shoves you out of the way on the street to the go-getter who shoves you out of a job in the office to the fuhrer who shoves you out of the world. And all of us have stopped to wonder, at some time or another, what it is that makes these people tick. What makes them run? Read the story of Sammy Glick.
