Life-Long Friends, Pioneers, Die Here 24 Hours Apart

Mrs. A. M. Templeton, 78, Mrs. M. S. Belieu, 82, Were Classmates at School

By peculiar coincidence, two life-long friends, pioneer residents of Douglas county, died less than 24 hours apart over the week-end in Roseburg. Mrs. A. M. Templeton died Saturday evening at her home, 504 Fowler street, and Mrs. Margaret S. Belieu died Sunday at her home, 608 West Oak street.

Parents of both ladies were early settlers in the Calapooia district and the two families lived on adjoining homesteads for many years. The two women were classmates in school.

Mrs. Templeton, 78, was born at Sutherlin, July 18, 1865. She had spent practically her entire life as a resident of Oregon.

Surviving are two brothers, George B. Adams, Coquille, and David Leroy Adams, Jackson Hole, Wyo. She was an aunt of Mrs. Sam Starmer and Mrs. Neta M. Bryant, both of Roseburg.

Mrs. Belieu, 82, was born Aug. 2, 1859, near Sutherlin and was a lifelong resident of Douglas county. She was married March 25, 1883, to J. G. Belieu, who died in June 1935. Mr. and Mrs. Belieu operated a rooming house in Roseburg for many years.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Cora Baker, Roseburg, and a grandson, Stuart S. Baker, Sacramento.

Funeral services for Mrs. Belieu will be held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel, Rev. H. P. Sconce officiating. Interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery.

Food Production Goals Boosted By Added War Needs

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The agriculture department is boosting the country's record-breaking 1942 food production goals so that the United States can, if necessary, become the veritable breadbasket, as well as the arsenal of the anti-axis nations.

The stepped-up goals may be announced later this week. The department is anxious to get them on record as quickly as possible so that they can be apportioned among farmers in time for them to make the necessary adjustments in their plans.

Japanese successes in the Pacific, coupled with official predictions that the war may be prolonged, have led Secretary Wickard and his crop control experts to review the tentative goals for such products as corn, oats, barley, soybeans, livestock, vegetable crops and dairy products.

These goals were established early in the fall, before the United States became involved in the war. While calling for the largest production in the history of American agriculture, the program was based upon the expectation that only Great Britain would be needing substantial quantities of food produced in this country.

Officials said that with Russia and China throwing greater and greater portions of their man power in the war, this country may have to supply both with considerable quantities of food. Farm officials no longer are

concerned about surpluses. They take the view that in a war such as is being waged now, there cannot be too much food and fiber supplies. They point out that present governmental power to place floors under grower prices make it possible for farmers to produce abundantly without suffering price drops.
